

Foreword

 ${f E}$ ven a brief 'flick through' of this year's Gazette will give the reader a sense of the richness and variety of life in the Regiment - an experience enhanced by the new 'all colour' format adopted for the first time this year. All of the companies have had the opportunity to exercise independently, as well as deploying to Kenya as a battle group, and all of this while serving in London District. For this the Regiment has much to thank Brigadier Richard Smith, formerly of the Rifles, who has just handed over as Deputy Commander, as well of course Lieutenant Colonel Chips Broughton, whose highly successful tour as Commanding Officer of the 1st Battalion has also just drawn to a close. Superimpose on this a Household Division cricket tour to South Africa; kayaking in New Zealand; and a full sporting calendar, and it is clear that service within the Regiment is as fulfilling as it has ever been. No surprise, therefore, that we are fully manned across the rank structure, but not without sterling efforts from our recruiters, reflected in Captain Andy Butcher's well deserved MBE in the New Year's Honours List.

2015 has seen a string of memorable Regimental anniversaries, including the 200th of the Battle of

VE Day and VJ Day have both been marked, as indeed have 2 other events of more direct Regimental note: the 40th anniversary of Prince Philip's Colonelcy, and Lieutenant Colonel Lord Wigram's 100th birthday, both of which were wonderful

'family' occasions and an honour to be party to.

Looking forward, the 1st Battalion is in the midst of a move to 11 Infantry Brigade under its new Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel Alex McKay. Mercifully this sees no change in barracks, but an exciting role as the first Spearhead Battalion within NATO's established Very High Readiness Joint Task Force, which is designed to reenergise NATO's deterrent effect against today's potential aggressors. The exercise programme will be busy, and the challenges particularly significant. given multinational nature of this force at the lower tactical level. But more of this in next year's Gazette, by when we will know if the UK is to remain part of the European Union, or head into the unknown...

In conclusion, I commend this excellent edition of the Grenadier Gazette to you, and warmly thank the Editors and all those who have supported them in its production.

Editorial Notes

Editing at a distance (or maybe not ...)

Another year passes and this journal reflects on the life of the Regiment between March 2015–February 2016. This time my half of the editing team has to be more remote when working on the journal this year, from the city of Riyadh and wider across the Arabian Peninsula as I remain fixed by the various demands and challenges of maintaining and developing the British-Saudi military relationship. It remains such a pleasure to keep monitoring and staying close to Regimental business in reading and working on Gazette 'copy', and a welcome break from the relentless reporting of the very challenging circumstances here in the Middle East. And yet even in the editing process without physical contact with Regimental Headquarters, or the wider personalities who we rely on to put together these 140-odd pages, I am surrounded by reminders of what the Regiment does in the Middle East.

Firstly, one of the key documents and examples of best practice with the Saudi Army remains the exercise done by the 1st Battalion in 2014 (and featured in the 2015 journal). The exercise which is now seen as a benchmark for future Land/Army exercises, with a requirement to up our game with the Saudi Army, the least known of all the Saudi Services to the UK, and arguably the most under pressure when it comes to defending its borders and prosecuting a campaign in Yemen. And we are looking in 2016 to another Battalion in the Army to come and match what the Battalion did two years ago. As a second reminder as I host the various and frequent senior visitors to the Kingdom, from the Vice Chief of Defence, the Senior UK Military Advisor to the Middle East, Lieutenant General Tom Beckett (who the Saudis love as they quiz him for his wider views of the region), the House of Commons Select Committee, they are met with a Saudi Honour Guard with an obvious stamp of British ceremonial drill. One of the last UK trainers was WO2 (RQMS) Cox, now in Regimental Headquarters. Add that to additional Household Division commitment to the region, including the Household Cavalry Mounted Regiment capacity building in Bahrain and a thriving Middle East Guards Association, it is refreshing to see opportunities for Divisional and Regimental soldiering under a imminent UK Gulf Strategy which should see increased presence across the Middle East, something our Regimental forebears will remember well. I am very conscious of how many Grenadiers served in Sharjah and elsewhere across the region. As the Saudis tell me often, we have been here for a very long time (100 years of diplomatic relations this year 2016, and over 100 years since the first British officer was killed in the service of King Abdul Aziz). Those threads of history, the 25th anniversary of the liberation of Kuwait currently being celebrated by an impressive number of Grenadier veterans in the UK during 2016 and the prospect of finding opportunities for Grenadiers to be here (conscious they have a different regional affiliation, though) makes the editing process a little less remote.

Gazette Aims

It may be worth reflecting on the ongoing aims of the Gazette as we look forward to next year. The Editorial team remains Regimental Treasurer, Major Andy Green, as Association Editor, and myself. We would want to encourage the maximum amount of varied contributions for both halves of the journal, balancing the mix of past and present content, from all parts of the serving and retired Regiment. As a result of direction from Regimental Headquarters, we have gone to all colour version to cover the very considerable achievements of everyone serving. It does introduce a different feel from previous years, and does justice to the considerable photographic skills of everyone who has contributed. Our detailed objectives for the journal are as follows:

- produce a really readable review of the past year, as colourful as we can make it, and anticipate future activities and Regimental priorities.
- keep a very accurate record of all serving and past Grenadiers and activities, conscious of the potential enquiries later, and ongoing requests to Regimental archivists.
- provide a very receptive forum for the widest selection of contributions possible. Hopefully everybody with an urge to write is given the opportunity to contribute.

We do keep a watch on all the other Household Division magazines, conscious that there are some very glossy Regimental versions out there, and many more photos than text but they are perhaps not so strong on the Regimental history or maintaining their records. Our aim is to keep this journal as a good balance between the traditional and the 'interesting'. Whether we can get that right, the readership should judge ...

We would offer huge congratulations to Capt Andy Butcher for being awarded MBE in this latest New Years Honours List as well as Senior Band Sgt Major (SBSM) Andrew Wood. He received the Meritorious Service Medal in the same list and will be presented with his medal by the Colonel at the GRANBY service on 26 Feb. Thereafter, he has reached the end of his service and is leaving the Army, having spent the past 12 years with the Regimental Band.

Contributions

We do thank all those who have contributed this year, which of course includes those on the Regimental Headquarters team, the Adjutant, and the obituary writers. You will note the considerable effort which has been made into this key area of Regimental records. We thank Philip Wright again for his fascinating articles, and then those in the serving Regiment who have exercised their pen for the first time. It is 'your' journal, and we can keep developing it together.

Regimental Headquarters

2015 passed with relentless speed and it seems that the wheel of life at Regimental Headquarters spins faster and faster with every year! The 'people' at RHQ have largely remained the same: Capt Fred Moynan, however, joined Regimental Headquarters in the Spring as Assistant Equerry to The Colonel and with responsibility for Officer Recruiting. Alan Ogden is our Regimental Archivist and Philip Wright our Regimental 'historian and scribe'. RQMS Mark Cox continues as RQMS RHQ, Sgt Rod Haughton is the Regimental Affairs NCO, LSgt 'Mac' Macmillan continues to be responsible for Regimental Property and visits. Dmr Walker has joined as our driver/orderly. Yomi Fowowe has joined RHQ as our civilian Admin Clerk.

On the 19th March, The Colonel paid a brief visit to Wellington Barracks where he visited Regimental Headquarters, Nijmegen Company and the Regimental Band. As well as presenting a number of Long Service and Good Conduct Medals, he managed to speak to nearly everyone.

The Regimental Headquarters annual 'High Pressure moments' (Regimental Remembrance Day, the Spring Trustees' Meeting, Spring Regimental Council Meeting and 1st Guards Club Dinner) came and went successfully

and without incident thanks to the hard work and support of all members of RHQ.

Once again this year, the First Guards Club Dinner was held at the Ironmongers' Hall, was attended by The Colonel and seemed to be considered a great success.

Nijmegen Company found No 4 Guard for The Queen's Birthday Parade, whilst the 1st Battalion provided the Street-liners along the Mall, before departing on exercise in Kenya.

On 22nd July, the Regimental Adjutant accompanied 10 members of the Ironmongers' Company to visit the 1st Battalion who were training in Kenya. Their account of the trip is chronicled elsewhere in this edition of the Gazette, but from a Regimental perspective the visit was a huge success, not only further cementing the affiliation between the Ironmongers and the Regiment, but also giving them a clear insight as to how a modern infantry battalion operates in the field.

On 10th September we held a small lunch party to celebrate the centenary of Lieutenant Colonel The Lord Wigram. Lord Wigram arrived earlier than the guests, in

order to watch Nijmegen Company dismounting Queen's Guard; after the dismount, the Regimental Band formed up outside the Officers' Mess and played Happy Birthday, after which they marched off to the British Grenadiers. During the lunch, the Lieutenant Colonel 'said a few words', to which Lord Wigram replied, clearly demonstrating how completely 'on the ball' he is! It was a very memorable lunch.

On 11th November, after chairing a Regimental Council Meeting at Buckingham Palace, The Colonel accompanied Her Majesty The Queen to a lunch to mark the 40th Anniversary of his Colonelcy. The lunch was held at the Cavalry and Guards Club and was attended by 60 Grenadiers from across the Regiment. It was a happy and most enjoyable occasion and both The Queen and The Colonel seemed to be on sparkling form.

And on 16th December came the welcome 'stand down' for Christmas and the New Year.

Whilst 2015 may have been slightly 'light' on Regimental events, there has been a lot of important work going on in the background:

RQMS Cox has been leading on a campaign to smarten up Regimental Headquarters, but in spite of a tight budget and with a lot of self-help, he has achieved a great deal and Regimental Headquarters is looking more 'spick and span' as a result.

Alan Ogden has been representing the Regiment on the Foot Guards project to get Soldiers Records digitized and then moved to the custody of the National Archive at Kew; this is proving to be a lengthy and complex procedure, but we are starting to make some headway. At the same time, another project is under way to transfer a large part of the Regimental Archive of Public Records to the National Army Museum. Most readers will be unaware that at RHQ we have neither the infrastructure nor resources to store and maintain Soldiers Records and Public Records properly as required by current regulations; in particular, the move of the Archives to the National Army Museum will ensure that they are stored and maintained in perfect condition, whilst being far more accessible to academics and interested members of the public.

The digitization of the Regimental photographic collection is still underway and we hope to have it completed by Spring 2016. Repairs have been made to a number of historic documents and books in the library and various miscellaneous photographs, audio cassettes, film reels and video tapes have been digitalized and are now available on the external hard drive in the Library.

During the Summer, the Library was 'sorted out' and a number of superfluous books were discarded; the remainder were re-ordered and re-

catalogued. In addition, visitors to the Library will see a rare King Edward VIII tunic on display.

Meanwhile, The Colonel's Fund Committee have held quarterly meetings and Matt Ellmer, the Regimental Casualty Officer, has been continuing his invaluable work supporting our Grenadier wounded and bereaved. The year has shown an increase in cases of mental difficulties coming to light, and a few of these cases have been very serious. It is clear that mental health is a neglected area of the service provided by the NHS, and notably so in the case of exservicemen. We have been assisting a Consultant Trauma Specialist who has been helping with our cases, in her efforts to persuade the NHS to improve the treatment pathway for these serious cases; her efforts are slowly beginning to yield results, but in the meantime, she is providing our Grenadiers who are suffering with vital help and treatment.

Finally, a portrait of LCpl James Ashworth, VC, by the artist Michael Alford and commissioned by the Regiment, is nearing completion. It is intended that the portrait should be hung in Battalion Headquarters of the 1st Battalion, so that it will be on view to all members of the Battalion.

Since the summer season closed in 2015, the dust has being settled on Horseguards, and the Band has been involved in an array of high profile events both at home and abroad.

Early in September, the Band took to the concert platform at the University of Worcester Arena. The concert was promoted by the local branch of the Grenadier Guards Association, with all important funds being raised for the ABF, The Soldiers Charity. The concert gave the Band an opportunity to showcase the talents of LCpl Dean Nixon on Soprano Saxophone and also featured LCpl Ben Beavis and the recently assigned LSgt Owen Duffield in a trumpet duet. Other highlights of the evening were the ever popular 'Finlandia', Elgar's 'Pomp and Circumstance' and the newly arranged 'Symphonic Animations'; an eclectic mix of the very best theme tunes from animated films, skilfully arranged by one of our colleagues from the Royal Marines Band Service. This was the opener to the Band's concert season which saw the Band later perform at Lincoln Cathedral in October, again in support of the ABF, The Soldiers Charity and in November joining forces with National Concert Band Champions, Eynsford Concert Band. The time spent with the combined Band gave the Grenadiers an opportunity to re-acquaint themselves with ex Director of Music, Major Mike Smith, who is also Musical Director of Eynsford. A few days later the Band embarked on an epic voyage of discovery on the high seas when undertaking a weeks adventurous training, courtesy of the Joint Service Adventure Sail Training Centre based in Kiel, Germany. The week away allowed the band take part in all aspects of Yacht Crew training. Thanks to the high level training and 'can do' approach to the tasks at hand, all members of the 'Grenadier Fleet' achieved the Royal Yacht Association qualification of Competent Crew. The trip certainly lived up to its adventurous expectations and the varying conditions of the Baltic Sea allowed crew members to bask in the sun during some rare downtime. At the other extreme they ventured to fix sails at the front of their boats in Force 9 gales. The week was a fantastic opportunity and one that all members of the band will certainly remember.

Early December sees the traditional 'Scarlet and Gold' Concert take place in Cadogan Hall in London. These concerts celebrate all things Household Division and this year's spectacle offered no exception. The Band is made up of the very best players from within the Household Division Bands, including the Band of the Household Cavalry. However, we do like to boast that the largest representation is from the Band of the Grenadier Guards! This year saw a commission from the pen of Rob Wiffin OBE, former Director of Music of the Central Band of the Royal Airforce and currently the Professor of Conducting at the Royal Military School of Music. The music was titled 'Scarlet and Gold' and featured the full band with assembled Fanfare Trumpets. The Household Division Big Band also made an appearance at the concert and played a number of Frank Sinatra charts in celebration of 'Old Blue Eyes' birth. Their encore featured the trumpet section including LCpl Beavis and LSgt Duffield in a piece aptly entitled 'Scream Machine'. The featured soloist of Scarlet and Gold was the inimitable talent that is Musician David Wong, Principal Clarinettist with the Band of the Grenadier Guards, who brought the house down with his rendition of 'Viktor's Tale', from the film 'The Terminal'.

As the final notes were ringing around Cadogan Hall, the Band took a trip back to Germany in support of British Forces. The tour started off with a Brass Quintet taking part in a number of school concerts and mess nights in and around Bielefeld. The remainder of the Band later made their way across the channel to take part in the Children's Christingle Service at Abinghof Church and at the Anglo German 'Nine Lessons and Carols' Service in Paderborn Cathedral.

The Band finally wound down for Christmas but unfortunately said 'Cheerio' to two cornerstone members of the Band. Firstly LCpl Alex Nixon from the clarinet section left to undertake Bandmaster training at The Royal Military School of Music, whilst LCpl David Porter from the trombone section left to undertake a recruiting post at the Armed Forces Careers Office in York. Major Davies had been with the Band for approximately three and a half years and moves to the Army Personnel Centre in Glasgow where he will be in charge of Career Management for the whole of the Corps of Army Music. Stepping into Major Davies's boots is Major Philip Stredwick, formally Director of Music of The Countess of Wessex String Orchestra. Major Stredwick is welcomed back into the Grenadier Family as he was one of the first Warrant Officer Bandmasters to the Band. To celebrate Major Davies's service and to mark the handing over of the baton, the Band assembled in the Guards Chapel for new Band photographs, separately featuring both Directors. The good news of New Year's Honours also spread into the Band as Senior Band Sergeant Major, Warrant Officer Class One, Andrew Wood, was awarded the Meritorious Service Medal just before he steps off with promotion in February. Mr Wood has served the Band of the Grenadier Guards for 12 years and been in the Army for 30. He is to be replaced by WO2, Band Sergeant Major, Mark Buckley, who comes in on promotion from the Band of the Irish Guards.

Looking forward to 2016, the Band will take part in the usual array of State and Ceremonial occasions and will attend to these duties with an extra spring in their step due to the 90th Birthday of Her Majesty the Queen. The Band are due to collaborate with colleagues from the Band of the Coldstream Guards for a special St George's Day Concert in Cadogan Hall to celebrate 360 years of continued service to the Crown. Both bands will come together to raise money for ABF, The Soldiers Charity. The concert takes place on the 23rd April 2016 at 7.30pm. The Band will perform a varied programme of music with help from guest soloists Philip Cobb, Principal Trumpet of the London Symphony Orchestra, Soprano, Suzanne Dymott and compere Christopher Biggins. Further highlights in 2016 will see the newly formed Guards Brass Ensemble, aka Ebury Brass, take part in a number of exciting projects. The group is formed as a brass ten piece primarily made up from members of the Band of the Grenadier Guards, with some friends from the Band of the Irish Guards along for the ride! The group have a number of events to look forwards to, including a concert at Pangbourne College in Reading alongside James Fountain, Principal Trumpet of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra. Later in the year the group will take part in workshops,

recitals and concerts at Huddersfield University, and at Saddleworth School in Yorkshire. The group are proud to be working working with the charity Children of Fire to help raise much needed awareness and funds towards their work in Africa. The Band are also due to send a Brass Quintet to Pakistan where they will perform at a number of high profile events in Lahore and Islamabad to celebrate her Majesty's 90th Birthday.

This change is centred around retention. In an effort to reverse the large number of recruits discharging from training the Army is modifying the way in which recruits are taught, led and developed. Although for many this feels like new territory it has been bubbling away for a number of years. Most notably some of the methods, including progressive physical punishment and increased amounts of praise and reward, were trialled at RMAS to great effect. Unnecessary shouting, a structured punishment system and instilling a greater understanding of why things were being done all worked to reduce discharge rates. Head a couple of hundred miles north to ITC and the same thing is also producing good results. The days of breaking a man down to build him up in the Army's image is no longer effective at an establishment where 30–40% drop out rates are unacceptable.

The change begins with the training teams. Each training team initially completes the instructional course at the Army Staff and Leadership School, building on their skills as an instructor and setting them up to succeed in the role they are about to undertake. They will then participate in a 'Zero Week' consisting of a series of briefs ranging from Diversity and Inclusion to the Commanding Officer's Directive. This is

followed by how the Army Leadership Code will be incorporated into the training of recruits. The week concludes with the training team presenting their plan to Battalion and Company Headquarters. This is their opportunity to demonstrate how they intend to undertake the next 28 weeks.

It's easy to look at much of this and realise it isn't that new or ground breaking. And you would be right. What is new is that many of these effective, retention inducing, ideas are now being made best practice. They are no longer the reserve of a dedicated and empathetic Platoon Sergeant. Now every training team is expected to train in, and not select out. Essentially training teams are expected to treat recruits as they themselves would wish to be treated. The simple fact is that people perform better, learn better and have higher levels of motivation when they are treated decently.

Treating people decently works, we know it does and have the statistics to prove it, but that only scratches the surface. There is now a real desire to get deeper into the psychology of what makes recruits tick. What can be done to further increase their self-confidence, motivation for remaining in training and overall performance? The application of sport science has been used to great effect to lower injury rates. So why not use Psychological Skills Training (PST) to improve confidence and performance.

PST is often said to be the difference between an elite athlete and a good one. The world of sport and business has used PST for over a decade and it absolutely makes sense that this form of training can be applied to the Army. However, the biggest battle you are going to face with something of this nature is acceptance from those who need to use it. It would be foolish to think that despite being such an adaptive Army we are totally open to change, particularly change of this nature.

With the correct recruitment process in place the amount of recruits that don't make it to the end should be minimal.

This is why the concept of specific PST lessons, including anxiety regulation, positive imagery and mental rehearsal, are being taught firstly to the training team and then to the recruits. This is currently still going through the trial phase but it works. This is going to become the norm at ITC and interest from the wider Army is encouraging.

The fact the Army has standardised its own leadership code is endemic of an organisation realising and embracing the need for change. The good old times were good, and in many cases great, but progress is essential. Guards Training Company embodies one of the oldest and most traditional parts of the Army, and without dropping standards; it has accepted and had many successes with this change. This is certainly not the finished product and there will undoubtedly be more refinement to come.

The Battalion has spent the last year successfully juggling the challenges of Public Duties and State Ceremonial, alongside some arduous training and deployments in Wales, Kenya, Cyprus and the Falkland Islands. Much of this year has seen the battalion separated, conducting various sub unit activities, but managing to deliver as a cohesive unit for the Trooping of the Colour and Exercise ASKARI STORM.

It was a matter of days into the New Year before the Battalion saw over 120 members of the Inkerman and Support Company deploying out to the Falkland Islands as the Roulement Infantry Company, assigned to the protection of the islands for a two month rotation. This is always a highlight for any rifle company's training year, with the joint training opportunities between all three forces abundant, as well as the autonomy of command at every level. Many a time have the section patrols around the islands been the making of a strong LSgt section commander. The Inkerman Company group were extremely fortunate with the weather and fair seas throughout the deployment allowing the exercises to be brilliantly supported by highly skilled Typhoon pilots as well as HMS Clyde. Never has a company felt more at home on a ship than the Ribs and it was a disappointment to many that there were no Royal Marines on board to remind them who their predecessors were!

During this time the remainder of the Queen's Company and No 2 Company deployed to Cyprus on Exercise LION

SUN. Although normally a company level deployment, the uplift in manpower proved extremely useful with both companies testing and pushing each other throughout. Early into the exercise they were faced with the rather unique situation of being removed from the exercise areas due to the Cypriot hunting season! Every man returned safe to the camp and this provided them all with some adventure training opportunities. The geography and climate again provided a suitable challenge for everyone prior to the battalion's deployment to Kenya later in the year.

The return of all the rifle companies in March saw the swift return to Public Duties ready for a busy Easter period. Aside from overseas exercises and their duties, the Battalion has, where possible, continued to send strong teams onto the sports field. The squash and hockey teams retained their respective London District Tournaments without losing a game! The football and rugby teams continue to perform well despite the lack of training time available owing to the busy schedule. The Battalion rugby team, Bearskins RFC, even made an appearance on BT Sport's Rugby Tonight programme as the demonstration team. Sadly the Battalion were unable to defend their Major Unit Cricket title owing to a poorly timed (for the cricket season) exercise in Kenya.

The Officers' Mess were fortunate enough to take part in a week of field sports on the northern coast of Scotland for a second year running. This is a brilliant opportunity to get as many people as possible together, something which proves much harder than it might first seem.

During April and May, having returned from various overseas exercises, the Battalion's focus was on providing the State Ceremonial role in support to London District, including Trooping the Colour. In preparation for the impending deployment to Kenya, the Battalion deployed, *en*

masse to Sennybridge Training area to conduct Operational Fitness Test (OFT) 6. Designed during the height of the Afghanistan campaign in order to prepare soldiers for carrying heavy weights great distances during patrol, it was an excellent measure of the levels of fitness within the companies. OFT 6 involves two three hour heavy weight marches covering 12 miles each time. This culminated in a battalion attack and represented a realistic test of what would lie ahead in Kenya. The greatest challenge proved to be weather as torrential rain and strong winds severely tested everyone's resolve throughout. The stamina and determination displayed by all were qualities that would prove vital later in the year. Soon after returning from Wales, in what was to become a familiar rapid turnaround, the Battalion were providing Numbers 1 to 10 half companies for the State Opening of Parliament.

After a brief Easter leave the start of June saw the companies being put through their paces during CBRN (chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear) concentration week. Never a favoured training topic amongst the guardsmen no doubt owing to the frequency of conducting degradation training, usually playing football in a full CBRN suit, in order to experience the debilitating effect of living and operating in a CBRN environment for a sustained period of time. Within recent operations there has been a relatively low CBRN threat, however with the nature of future conflict as unpredictable as it is, maintaining good skills and knowledge is imperative. Having street lined for the Trooping of the Colour, conducted the Garter Service, the Battalion was ready to deploy to Kenya.

Exercise ASKARI STORM focuses on training and testing light role infantry battalions in an arduous and diverse

environment. The main exercise is broken down into four subparts: Exercises ASKARI WARRIOR, ASKARI CENTURIAN, ASKARI SPARTAN and ASKARI IMPI. The scenario is loosely based on East Africa and sees a UK infantry brigade deployed as part of a larger UN Multi National Task Force to re-establish the integrity of an international border after a hostile neighbouring country invaded with the aim of securing key population areas and resources. With a conventional adversary operating in a multifarious environment such as east Africa there are numerous complexities that can manifest themselves depending on the actions of the soldiers on the ground. The design and contributing elements of the exercise make for a very real and demanding scenario.

The Battalion was based out of a transit camp next door to the Kenyan Air Force's Laikipia Airbase on the outskirts of Nanyuki, a sprawling typically African town that has continued to expand exponentially with each passing year of the British Army's presence in the country. Located in the shadow of Mount Kenya, the views are fantastic and the weather slightly erratic if predictable; one can almost guarantee rain in the afternoon as the dramatic clouds form off the beautiful peak of Mount Kenya. The camp is sparse and austere and despite the 12 hours of sunshine, cold 'solar' showers will be the lasting memory. ASKARI WARRIOR saw the battlegroup deploy to the area of Ole Doinyo Lemboro, around one hour north of Nanyuki, to conduct company-led live and blank training. This was an excellent opportunity for the companies to plan and conduct their own training, something that is treasured by sub unit commanders. Based out of a company harbour in the middle of the bush, the training started at the lowest level of individual skills on a live field firing range and culminated in a complex and arduous live platoon attack by day and night. The

close terrain made navigating and operating by both day and night extremely difficult and tested both section and platoon commanders alike as well as keeping all ranks on their toes with some exceptionally close encounters with lions, elephants and hyenas to name but a few.

After a brief resupply back at camp the battlegroup then moved north to Archer's Post Training Area. Having conducted their own internally led training, ASAKARI CENTURIAN saw the companies being put through their paces by BATUK (British Army Training Unit Kenya) in a three way rotation consisting of a CALFEX (combined arms live fire exercise), enabling and defensive phases. With each phase being 56 hours in duration the chance to rest was minimal and each phase was demanding in its own way. The defensive phase saw the companies inserting into a readvmade company defensive position defending the key feature of God's Bridge. The company were probed throughout the day and night by a determined enemy using a myriad of tactics including a CBRN weapon. Many forgotten lessons were remembered quickly and the need to be adaptive and creative when in defence was a well identified lesson. During the enabling phase the companies were given the task of escorting a convoy along a 26km route with a high threat of both conventional and non-conventional adversaries. This phase saw the companies working closely with the engineers attached to the battlegroup for the first time, and the learning curve was steep - obstacle crossing not being as formative to light infantry as it does to armoured infantry owing to our ability to cross most obstacles on foot. However the lessons learnt put the battlegroup in good stead to excel later in the exercise. The final phase was an exceptionally demanding CALFEX that challenged everyone within the companies from the junior guardsman to the company

commanders. Commendation must go the rifle companies for their performances throughout the CALFEX with the grit, determination and no little tactical acumen displayed drawing lavish praise from the BATUK staff.

The battalion then returned to camp in Nanyuki for a brief respite and battleprep before deploying onto the final exercise. The scenario saw the Grenadier Guards Battlegroup operating as part of a UK Brigade moving into a contested area to defeat a conventional enemy force before moving into a battlegroup defence. Complexity was added with over 500 locally employed civilians role playing, at times, a remarkably convincing local population of various tribes and religions. The exercise culminated in an exceptionally arduous final attack that saw the companies ascending what can only be described as 'hills on steroids' in order to clear enemy positions. The fact that the platoons were racing each other up them is testament to the levels of fitness that had been built up over the past year in preparation for the exercise. The more observant of the guardsmen might well have noticed a lone 9x9 tent erected on the highest feature overlooking the area for the final attack; it was here that the Regimental Adjutant and the Temporary Equerry were hosting 10 members of the Ironmongers' Company, who had come out to Kenya to visit the 1st Battalion. Before flying home a large proportion of the Battalion were fortunate enough to take part in various adventure training activities at some uniquely African locations; the highlight of which was Exercise COCKNEY LENANA, a six day expedition to climb Mount Kenya in preparation for a planned month long expedition to Nepal at some stage in the near future.

Following some much needed summer leave, the battalion returned to work for a final stint in London District conducting Public Duties. The principle occasion in this was the state visit of the President of China, with Major Ben Jesty commanding the Guard of honour. Elements of the Queen's Company deployed back to Kenya in order to provide range teams, and over the Christmas period, No 2 Company provided the Roulement Infantry Company in the Falklands. At the time of writing (January 2016) the Battalion is moving rapidly towards its re-subordination to 11 Infantry Brigade. This will see a multitude of exercises from Kenya to Latvia followed another re-subordination to 20 Brigade and NATO as the spearhead battlegroup. Coinciding with the arrival of the new Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel Alex McKay MBE, the Battalion has a busy and demanding year ahead.

THE QUEEN'S COMPANY

The Queen's Company Permanent Range Team

It was only a few short weeks after returning from Kenya on a very successful Exercise ASKARI STORM that The Queen's Company found itself once again on a plane to Nairobi. This time not as exercising troops but as part of the team that delivered this tough test to the 3 PARA Battlegroup. The company was not only asked to provide range staff and observer mentors to the exercise but also a large Force Protection platoon that was kept busy in the Nanyuki Show Ground (NSG), Laikipia Air Base (LAB) East and the airfield. Along with The Queen's Company there was a strong contingent of The Inkerman Company and Support Company who were tasked with providing the Safety and Directing Staff for their opposing numbers in 3 PARA.

After what felt like a slow start to the exercise with traces to be drawn, long recces out on the ranges and probably too many milkshakes in the NAAFI, the Queen's Company was ready to deploy to Archers Post to deliver the first part of the CALFEX (Combined Arms Live Fire Exercise). This challenging part of the exercise consists of a defensive lane, an enabling lane and the CALFEX over a week in some difficult and hot terrain. The BATUK training staff run both the Defensive and Enabling lanes which left The Queen's Company to set-up, run and supervise the CALFEX. There were some initial problems

which were difficult to overcome such as the sheer heat of the Archers Post training area and the vast areas that we were covering.

The heat sapped the battery life from the electronic targets but also interfered with the range of the radio transmitter which meant Guardsman Owen, as the target operator, was often seen right behind the assaulting section to ensure the range ran smoothly which was no mean feat in that level of heat. The problem of distance could not obviously be solved but it was made easier by a very efficient supply column run by Pay Sergeant Bailey who always managed to get hot meals and water to the safety staff with few vehicles and over long and rough roads.

Locals cause further problems by wandering into the Range Danger Area at night with their herds and then proving hard to move by helicopter in the morning. This meant that the start of ranges was often delayed, meaning that by the time the ranges went live we were very much in the full heat of the day. Following the successful completion of all three PARA Rifle Companies through the Company Calfex, the PRT had to turn its attention to the Battle Group range which had been designed by fellow Grenadier Guards officer Major Hathaway-White. This was a complicated range with many moving parts which tested both the exercising troops and the PRT which had now doubled in size (thanks to the 2 RGR COEFOR) to deal with the scale and complexity of a Battle Group range. For many of the junior members of 3 PARA and the PRT this range also gave an opportunity to see the effect of Mortars on a FOB and the firing of several Javelin missiles, safety provided by Capt Sanford and

CSgt Stott respectively.

With some relief the PRT was able to leave the furnace of Archers Post and return to LAB East before redeploying in a number of roles to assist the BATUK staff with the final exercise on the Lolldaiga and Ole Naishu ranches. The Company was now split up over a large area as village managers and observer mentors. This gave a chance for the village managers to get to know many of the local nationals that work to make the exercise as realistic as possible and the observer mentors an insight into the planning and execution of the Battle Groups operations. These final weeks in

Kenya were accompanied by the constant threat by the weather to break for the rainy season. Fortunately for everyone the dark clouds did not break until after the end of the exercise and the only unfortunate event was a non-lethal elephant attack on the second in command of A Company which served as a reminder to us that the African savannah can be a dangerous place if it is not taken seriously.

Although another trip to Kenya so quickly after leaving it as exercising troops was not on the top things to do over summer leave for many in the PRT, but the job was done with the normal efficiency and professionalism that can be expected. Exercise ASKARI STORM is a great exercise and all involved in the PRT were keen to return to Kenya in May this year to get suck into the African veldt once more.


return to London.

Horse Guards News

As ever the Horse Guards focus for the year has been on activity in London and delivering the usual range of glittering public spectacle in the form of the State Visits, the State Opening of Parliament, the Troop and the Cenotaph Parade. At each of these the Grenadiers – the Battalion, Nijmegen Company or both – contributed faultlessly, no mean feat given their very demanding training programmes which have seen them bouncing between London and Wales, Kenya and the Falkands on an almost monthly basis.

This has been a year of notable commemorations and anniversaries – at each of which the Household Division staff at Horse Guards have arranged the military ceremonial and at each of which London District troops and men and women of the Household Division have delivered in memorable style: the Herrick Commemoration Service, the Gallipoli Centenary Commemoration, the VE and VJ Day commemorations and, by no means the most important, but definitely the most enjoyable, the commemoration of the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Waterloo.

We used the Battle of Waterloo commemorations as the main theme for the Beating Retreat in June and included 100 re-enactors and their cannon within the finale - they used this as final pre-deployment training before joining 3900 fellow enthusiasts on the battlefield for the main celebrations a week later. The Beating Retreats went fantastically well - not only because of the usual world class musical performances from the Massed Bands and various guests but because we continue to improve our marketing and front of house efforts and so, for the second year running, all seats sold out on both nights. This is important as, in addition to covering the MOD's costs and raising a tidy sum for the Houshold Division and other charities, full to bursting stands create a tremendous atmosphere which is very impressive to the senior guest - the Duchess of Cornwall took the salute this year – and the very many Defence, Army, diplomatic and community guests who are invited to spend an evening with the Household Division.

The Welsh Guards trooped their Colour this year – a brand new one that had been presented by Her Majesty at a glorious Windsor Quadrangle parade just the month before – and, along with the PDICs who provide the other Guards, produced an immaculate Queen's Birthday Parade befitting of their centenary year. This years parade also marked the retirement of Garrison

Sergeant Major Mott OBE MVO who after 13 years in the post and guiding 10s of 1000s of Guardsmen through every concievable ceremonial event swaps his bearskin and Horse Guards for a future in Kentucky, USA.

The Grenadiers and Welsh are both coming to the end of their first 'A2020 era' 3 year rotation in London and are ready to move back to the Field Army for a spell. Both battalions have worked hard to support Public Duties while maintaining their operational skills – an effort which has forced both to move between ceremonial and the field frequently with little break. Arranging next weeks street-lining half companies or guard changes with Adjutants who are sitting in Kenya or Canada is now almost the norm and watching the men adapt to this with no drop in standard on parade has been very impressive. Those battalions move to 11 and 12 Brigades in early Feb 16 and we look forward to welcoming the Coldsteam and Irish Guards back to London in their place.

Exercise COCKNEY WAKA

exercise COCKNEY WAKA saw 12 members of the EGrenadier Guards, accompanied by two instructors make their way to New Zealand to conduct an eight day sea kayaking expedition in December 2015. It was the fruition of over 12 months of planning and re-planning. As many readers will be aware, Adventurous Training, or AT is it is more commonly known, is a core tenet of the military. It presents soldiers with unique opportunities to challenge themselves in unfamiliar environments and situations, whilst allowing them experience a myriad of emotions from fear to euphoria. The ability of AT to enhance teambuilding and leadership qualities is also ubiquitous. With the 're-shakes' that the recent Strategic and Defence Security Reviews of 2010 and 2015 have bought respectively it remains clear that AT will and must continue. When the incumbent Chief of the General Staff was Commander Land Forces he directed that at least 1/3 of a unit should conduct some type of AT per annum. With the steady rotation of State Ceremonial Public Duties that the Grenadier Guards have undertaken over the last 2-3 years this directive has been challenging but nonetheless, achievable. Readers will be familiar with the many AT trips that members of the Battalion have undertaken that have been reported on in these pages.

With the Battalion's 2.5-year tenure in London District drawing to a close it was felt that the Battalion should mount a major overseas expedition under the London District flag whilst the opportunities and more importantly time still prevailed. The planning of a far-flung expedition is no mean feat but mercifully there are many fonts of knowledge within the Army and wider military AT world. So it was with access to this knowledge that the Battalion's AT cell set about planning Exercise COCKNEY WAKA (Waka meaning canoe in Maori). What attracted most about a sea kayaking expedition in New Zealand was that one had only been conducted once within the last 20 years. Without doubt the best area to paddle is the Marlborough Sounds, a 4,000km2 area of sunken valleys at the top of the south island of New Zealand. Its many coves and inlets mean that despite covering only a small area geographically of the island, it actually makes up more than 1/4 of New Zealand's 17,209km total coastline.

The aspiration of the expedition was for 12 novice sea kayakers to undertake an eight day, point-to-point, and unsupported expedition covering over 100 miles. As one can imagine, finding volunteers for an expedition of this nature did prove difficult, particularly given the way in which guardsmen of today actively seek out and embrace new and challenging adventures. Although one junior non

commissioned officer did have a slightly different point of view when we quite eloquently exclaimed 'kayaking in December, what have I done to end up this proverbial creek, this time with a paddle?'. Fortunately, for him, he oversaw the fact that December is the start of New Zealand's summer. Despite the fact we were taking 12 novices out on the expedition; military AT guidelines dictated that all participants had to gain their Basic Kayak Foundation (K2F). Fortunately, the Battalion's Overseas Training Exercise for 2015 took place in Kenya. This allowed 20 potential expedition members to spend a week at the end of the exercise paddling on the River Mathioya.

The last weekend in November saw the 12 members of the expedition (1 Captain, 1 SNCO, 2 JNCOs and 8 Gdsm) along with the two instructors (WO1 Navin, RAPTC SMI in HQ London District & Mr Huw Richards SIO at SDW in Sennybridge) meet at Lille Barracks to issue the necessary kit and equipment and conduct a final administration check before departing for Heathrow for our flights onto Christchurch. Owing to a late change in the personnel, 13 members of the group were flying via Dubai and Sydney whilst a lone instructor was flying the opposite (and more dangerous!) way around the world via Los Angeles and Auckland. Given that New Zealand is as good as the opposite side of the world to the UK, flying times were nearly comparable and we reformed in the arrivals lounge at Christchurch airport having lost a day somewhere over the Indian Ocean. Given New Zealand's strict policy on the importing (accidental or otherwise) of foreign soils and objects there was a bit of a delay clearing customs owing to the amount of outdoor expedition equipment we were carrying. With tents and clothing checked for foreign 'nasties' and the transport collected we started the first part of our domestic journey. The road from Christchurch to Picton is one of the most stunning coastal drives; sadly this was lost on the group after 30 hours of travelling. Thankfully we made the 308km journey in one piece and arrived at our campsite in Anakiwa to rain and fog. Fortunately the hosts of our campsite took pity upon us and rather than spending our first night under canvas kindly put us up in their empty cabins. The following day we awoke to beautiful sunshine, much more akin to what we were expecting, and made the short journey to our kayak hire company and hosts/organisers Sea Kayak Adventures. This company specialised in catering for kayak expeditions and trips and as such were well equipped to provide us with suitable 2-man kayaks. There was some apprehension prior to seeing them that we would struggle to fit all of our equipment and food for 8 days into the kayaks. Our fears were allayed with guarantees that, with smart packing, there was sufficient space for food and water for a trip more than double the length of time of ours. Time was spent with the instructors pouring over maps and

charts, confirming routes, layovers, campsite locations and emergency procedures for the expedition.

With an eye on developing the teamwork and leadership skills of the junior members, each boat (2 men) was issued with the correct amount of CILOR (cash in lieu of rations) with instructions that they were to use to shop for the food for the next 8 ½ days. Should they run out or miscalculate, there would be no reserves! The instructors were also eager that each boat should be in charge of providing the route cards and subsequently navigating each day, thereby developing useful military skills as well as introducing everyone to navigation and sea. With supplies bought and a final afternoon spent briefing the route and safety procedures to the group we settled into the evening with a final BBQ. The following morning was an early rise in order to pack the kayaks and then transport them to our starting point, Anakiwa, within the Queen Charlotte Sound. The sun was showing glimpses through the cloud cover and there was a brisk wind. Weather forecasts were of gales in the Cook Straits but the local chat was that the high mountainsides dominating the Marlborough Sounds would greatly reduce the wind within the bays. As we were to find out, although this was the case, the topography of the land resulted in unpredictable wind directions within the Sounds.

After a final photo call we mounted our kayaks and set sail. The skegs, or rudders took a little bit of getting used to but quickly all 7 boats were making good headway with a tailwind and spurts of sunshine. Day One was to prove a

tough introduction to sea kayaking with the southerly winds bringing rain and a sharp drop in temperatures. Very quickly we discovered that, as predicted, wind direction quickly changed depending on what the lay of the land was making it do. This more often than not meant that it was blowing out of the bays that lined our routes. As a result every bay we crossed involved a hard 30-40 minute slog, upwind before turning and making a run with the wind in the hope that we had made sufficient distance across the bay so as to avoid tacking again into the wind. It took a bit of practise but at the end of 6 hours paddling and 23km travelled we made it; gratefully, to our first campsite at Ranimera. All of our campsites along the route proved very similar, only accessible by sea, a tap or stream for drinking water and a long drop latrine. The first cooked meal passed without incident and the party settled in for a solid night's sleep.

We woke to beautiful sunshine and still waters the following morning, we were further treated to a close encounter with a pod of dolphins which swam around our boats for 30 minutes or so. This wasn't the only encounter we had with the native wildlife but it certainly was a brilliant experience for all. Day Two saw us paddle 14km from Ranimera to Blumine Island. An early issue with a broken skeg was overcome with plasti-cuffs and tape before continuing on our way. Blumine Island was an old WW2 naval fort with guns and submarine lookouts pointing out into the Straits; this was a 250m climb from the campsite but was a just reward for those who attempted it with

stunning views into the Straits. Day Three saw us paddle 16km from Blumine Island to Cannibal Cove. Another early problem, this time with a steering mechanism, was overcome before a couple of large bay crossings. The lunchtime stop for the day saw us halt in Ship Cove; the first spot Captain James Cook landed in New Zealand with his ship Endeavour in 1770. There now stands a large monument to Captain Cook and his feats, many of which were both astounding and humorous. Cannibal Cove saw us the furthest east and closest to the Cook Straits. Unfortunately the following day brought the rain, wind and fog that the forecasters had predicted. Now nearly halfway through we were undeterred and donned cagoules for the day's paddle back to Punga Cove. Day Five saw us collected by

our kayak hire company and portaged by vehicle to allow us to paddle in the Pelorus Sound, the biggest of the three. The wind was again to prove against us as we attempted to make for our camp 7km down Nydia Bay. Unfortunately as we arrived at the bay the wind speed made the water look like a fast flowing river that we were going to try and paddle upstream. A hasty navigation adjustment was made and we ran with the wind to reach our 5th and most stunning campsite in Jacob's Bay. The bay proved fruitful for some of the guardsmen who caught their first fish of the week; they fried it over their cookers for a tasty if not plentiful supplement having covered 29km in the day.

The final few days proved uneventful if just as stunningly beautiful with further encounters with seals, one of whom was intent on showing off as much as possible. Our eighth and final day saw us complete our expedition in Duncan's Bay having paddled a total of 152km with an average of 6.5 hours paddling per day. It was with sore backs, shoulders and blistered hands that we formed into extended line as we

pulled into the finishing point at Duncan's Bay with an immense sense of achievement coupled with a feeling that we would only truly appreciate what we had seen and done after the event. We were fortunate to spend our final day exploring Christchurch, a wonderful city still recovering from the 2011 earthquake that destroyed large amounts of the city. It was with somewhat heavy hearts that we departed for London and Christmas leave having had a truly unique experience in one of the most stunning places on Earth coupled with a convivial and generous population. The expedition certainly tested the resolve of many taking part in it and pushed us both physically and mentally all the while helping to develop future junior non-commissioned officers of the future. With the experience gained both in Kenya and New Zealand there is definite interest amongst the guardsmen in gaining their instructor qualifications and being able to lead similar expeditions in the future and there are plans afoot for paddling the River Wye as well as taking part in the Devizes to Westminster canoe race; watch these pages!



Hadrians Wall: Nov 23–27 2015

Late in November last year the Signals Platoon of the 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards undertook a monstrous task. A small team would travel all the way to Hadrian's Wall, an 84 mile long path, that would see them walk from east coast to west coast and do so in three days. We all understood that this would be hard, and being that this was an exercise in Junior Non-Commissioned Officer development, that we would only have ourselves and our peers to look to for inspiration and strength when the going got tough. With all that in mind the small team assembled.

Well, that small team was us, Capt Gauntlet, CSgt Harrell, Sgt Saxton, LSgt Jallow, LCpl Morris, LCpl McDonald, LCpl Robinson, Gdsm Harvey and Gdsm Alexander. We few humble signallers, were ready to take on this challenge.

Day One, Monday, started with leaving Aldershot for Otterburn camp. Once there we settled down for the night and rested, insuring our full strength would be available for the next days activity.

Tuesday quickly came around, which meant time to get up, get ready and hop on the transport, the destination of the start of the walk would be Bowness-On-Solway, a tiny village 10kms or so from Carlisle on the west coast of England. Once at Bowness-On-Solway we dismounted the minibus and began the walk. What took place over the next 50km until we finally finished the day's leg, is only comparable to Frodo's Fellowship from the Lord of the Rings films. We first walked our way to Carlisle, which was hard going enough, where shortly after we lost our first member to injury. So CSgt Harrell was left in the safe

hands of the admin team, Sgt Saxton and Gdsm Harvey. The remainder then pushed forward and soldiered on. Another long leg of increasingly arduous terrain rose up to meet us after we departed the Carlisle area, the going only got tougher from here. With darkness falling and the team's legs rapidly fatiguing, we were lucky to happen upon a village called Newtown where our transport was waiting for us, to take us back to Otterburn.

Wednesday began with aches and pains from the previous day's exertions. Every member of the walking team felt the pain. After having our breakfast, we departed Otterburn camp once again. We were then dropped off in Newtown, where the walk began anew. The morning saw us traverse some hills of varying steepness and by the time we were stopping briefly to have lunch, the toll was already showing on our fatigued legs. From midday onwards every step for every member was a personal battle, something as simple as placing one foot in front of the other becoming increasingly more difficult. Almost 100km in and over half way across the country, the decision was made by the officer in command, Capt Gauntlet, that the team were no longer in a fit state to continue, injuries becoming more and more likely amongst the walkers.

So we withdrew back to Otterburn, defeated in the sense that we hadn't achieved our goal of completing the wall in our given time frame but bolstered with the knowledge that we had in fact achieved far more than anyone could have estimated in just two days.

With that, the decision was made to return to Aldershot on the Thursday, with a view to having a long weekend, a 'well done' from the Company Commander, which was very well received from the men. Those few days will forever be remembered by all involved, characterised by the almost intolerable fatigue felt by all in our pursuit to achieve our goal.

In order to further 'cement' the Affiliation between the Regiment and The Ironmongers' Company (a City Livery Company), we invited a party of 10 from the Ironmongers' Company to visit the 1st Battalion on Exercise Askari Storm in Kenya. What follows is their 'take' on the visit:

After considerable planning and instruction from the Assistant Clerk, a group of ten Ironmongers assembled on Wednesday 22nd July at Heathrow's T5 for the eight hour flight to Nairobi.

On the plane we caught up with Major General Sir George Norton, the Regimental Lieutenant Colonel and also an Ironmonger, and Major Grant Baker, the Regimental Adjutant, and so the full touring party was assembled.

We were met at Nairobi Airport by Capt Fred Moynan who had gone on ahead as an advance party to ensure the visit went without a hitch. The evening air was cool and comfortable. Capt Moynan brought with him three guardsmen who drove us in a collection of 4x4s for the entire expedition. 40 minutes later, after witnessing some appalling Kenyan driving, we were collecting the keys for our rooms at the wonderful Muthaiga Club (of 'Out of Africa' and 'White Mischief' fame). The ambience and smell of wax in the corridors took us all immediately back to what it must have been like in colonial times.

Despite the late hour of our arrival, we were fed and watered and then to bed for the longer road trip 'up country' to Nanyuki situated just north of the Equator (0° 01' North).

A full spread for breakfast on Thursday set us up for the four hour trip to Nanyuki, leaving promptly at 0830hrs. There was just time in the schedule to stretch our legs half-way to Nanyuki at a touristy curio shop offering 'just for you, a special price' deals and again at the Equator to take photos. The time spent in the vehicles was a good opportunity to talk with the drivers who had been on multiple tours of Afghanistan and had both amusing and very sad stories to tell.

1230hrs saw us arrive at the Nanyuki Sports Club with check-in completed in short order. We were soon back into the 4x4s and heading off to EXCON (Exercise Control) in the Kenyan back country to learn what the Grenadier Guards had been doing the last five weeks on exercise.

Here we were introduced to the Deployable Tactical Engagement Simulation training system (DTES) that monitors each soldier's position and shooting results and reports back to EXCON in real time with such accuracy that it can even tell if the soldier is standing up or lying down. This allows the training team to track and then play back troop movements for analysis and feedback to the men in a subsequent debrief. The weapons and webbing the soldiers use/wear also includes laser systems which pick up 'hits' and disable the targeted soldier's weapon reporting him as injured or killed dependent on where he was hit.

After a brief, recent history of the Guards worldwide movements (most recently 'the red stuff' such as Trooping the Colour) given by Brigadier Richard Smith, Deputy Commander London District, Colonel Tom Vallings, Commander BATUK (British Army Training Unit Kenya), and Major Alex Hutton (also BATUK) talked us through the

role of BATUK and the timeline and objectives of the current Grenadiers' six-week training programme.

We were told that the culmination of the programme was an attack by the three companies of the Grenadiers, with support from the Royal Engineers and the Royal Artillery, to take the three hills (codenamed Gold, Silver and Bronze) overlooking the village of Katooma (a village fabricated for the exercise) and then secure the village.

The BATUK team work incredibly hard to deliver a first class training environment using officers from many regiments, other ranks and civilian contractors. They deliver over 159 'nights out' a year on training manoeuvres within the 240,000 hectares of ground available. All this is currently delivered under the uncertainty of a renegotiation of the

Defence Cooperation Agreement (DCA) with the Kenyan Government which could mean the whole operation gets shut down if a new agreement can't be reached soon.

The timing of the presentations was impeccable as, whilst listening to the instructors and safely under canvas, the heavens opened for a dose of tropical downpour! The late afternoon shower proved to be a regular feature of each day.

We had been led to believe that we should expect that night's accommodation to be in line with a typical soldier's lot in the field. In the end, however, Major 'Stumpy' Keeley, Quartermaster of the Grenadier Guards and his team pulled out all the stops with a fantastic BBQ and some superbly sited tents furnished with camp beds and sleeping bags. It was a cold but dry night and most settled down early due to H hour being scheduled for 0541hrs. A few of the 'younger' members gave forth on a range of subjects burning the midnight oil in confab with the NCOs, who also provided more stories from their postings. A fabulous dawn saw us given a grandstand view of the upcoming final assault.

The sound of a spotter plane signalled the start of proceedings closely followed by some impressively percussive flash bangs representing a mortar attack on Grenadiers. The attack was on! We were joined by Capt Barry Cork, Royal Gurkha Rifles, who had a DTES laptop showing the system we had viewed the day before. This allowed us to follow events both on the screen and from our great vantage point. It soon became apparent that the enemy had located the Grenadiers as they formed up and carefully laid plans had to be changed at the last minute. From our vantage point we were able to see Queen's Company secure Gold, but at the expense of 50% casualties, and then see No 2 Company and the Inkerman Company skirt around our position to enable No 2 Company to attack Silver and witness Inkerman Company almost sprinting the mile to engage and secure Bronze as the deadline Brigadier Smith had said he wanted the exercise completed by loomed. The enemy fought hard with machine guns in entrenched positions but the expertise of the Grenadiers eventually won the day and, four hours later, the enemy was neutralised.

We then went down to the village to meet some of the very exhausted soldiers. We had all been very impressed with the professionalism of the soldiers, especially if one considers that the Grenadiers spend over 50% of their time on ceremonial duties.

We Ironmongers then retired to Nanyuki Sports Club for a shower and a little, light lunch. The possibility of golf was considered but quickly shelved as the torrential rain arrived, so a welcome afternoon siesta was the answer.

Early evening took us to Cape Chestnut restaurant to dine with some of the Grenadier Officers and a few of the BATUK staff. The company, food and wine were excellent. Another opportunity to hear how incredibly busy they have been and how impressed the BATUK team were by the Battalion's performance as a whole.

The next day (Saturday) took us to LAB(E) (Laikipia Air Base East) on the outskirts of Nanyuki, where the visiting battalions are based. After a 'brew', necessitated by the Army ethos of 'hurry up and wait', we were taken to hear a presentation delivered by Major Price, Royal Engineers. He is the Project Continuity Officer responsible for delivering the next phases of development of the base's infrastructure which, if completed, would cost over £120 million. The job isn't made any easier by the use of local contractors with a different take on interpreting both the building regulations and the architect's plans, coupled with the ongoing uncertainty over whether there will actually be a British presence at the base at all if the DCA is not renewed.

We then went to meet the DTES team again who allowed us to try the laser systems first hand firing antitank weapons and RPGs at targets. The Senior Warden volunteered to walk through a set of TES landmines which exploded with plenty of noise and showers of talcum powder. To simulate the reality of the dangers faced by soldiers on tour in Afghanistan, the DTES team even have suicide vests in the training armoury.

Lunch was in the base canteen with the Officers and NCOs from the Grenadiers as well as other regiments involved in the current exercise. In the Grenadiers' exercise, the enemy was played by the Rifles regiment. The esprit de corps was very evident across all the regiments and ranks. During the meal, the Master presented an Ironmongers' plaque to the Grenadiers' Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel The Hon Charles (Chips) Broughton MBE.

The afternoon was our own for some R&R and preparation for the Battalion Cocktail Party at Le Rustique restaurant. This was another triumph of the Regiment's hospitality with local landowners and worthies also invited. The Grenadier Guards' Corps of Drums kindly put on a fantastic show and the Master was given the honour of taking the salute. The Corps' members join without any previous musical experience and learn on the job.

Sunday morning came and we mounted up to be driven by our ever-patient, relentlessly cheerful drivers on the hour's journey to Borana Lodge. The last part of the drive was across a very rough track (which Andrew Wauchope must have found very painful lying down in the front seat with tendonitis) but the destination proved to be every bit worth the journey. Borana Lodge is spectacularly located and very well appointed. After a delicious lunch we were taken out in safari Land Rovers driven by knowledgeable guides. The guides found us elephants, lions (with cubs), buffalo, giraffe, zebra, a jackal and many impala, gazelle, hartebeest and oryx.

Monday morning's horse ride at 7.30am and subsequent Land Rover safari brought warthog, a goshawk and a black Rhino. Even from the verandas of the Lodge one could view the water hole and its visitors as well as the hyrax living just under the Lodge's buildings.

In the early afternoon we took the five hour drive back to Nairobi with a short road-side stop for souvenirs and an evening meal at the Muthaiga Club before the return to the UK. The ETA at Muthaiga had been set for 1800hrs by Capt Moynan and we rolled through the gates at 1800hrs to the second! Even the Nairobi traffic could not stop the Grenadiers delivering us to the airport in good time for the flight (although there were some scary overtaking manoeuvres to avoid).

The Ironmonger touring party would like to thank all the officers and men for the time they gave to us to allow an insight into the life and work of an active infantry battalion and support units. They also wish to thank the Battalion for its kind generosity in paying for all the in-country costs of the trip. Special thanks to Sir George Norton and Major Baker for their own insight into what was happening around us. A final, and biggest, thank you to Capt Fred Moynan for organising the trip with such panache and good humour ("I am only doing my job") and making it such an unforgettable experience.

Given all that the Grenadier Guards contribute to protecting our national interests, and with the potentially life changing risks that they run whilst on active duty, the Ironmongers' contribution to the Colonel's fund is unarguably an extremely worthwhile involvement in helping the Regiment look after wounded soldiers who need rehabilitation and others (and their families) who struggle upon having left active service.

Amongst the tourists were eight Grenadiers, five Coldstreamers, two Welsh Guards, two Household Cavalrymen, one Irish Guard, one Scots Guard and The Equerry to HRH The Prince of Wales. With the rank range from Guardsman (and Trooper) to Lieutenant Colonel, it presented a unique opportunity for many serving Officers and other ranks to go on a once-in-a-lifetime sports tour.

After a day acclimatising at The Victoria and Alfred Waterfront, the players dusted off the cobwebs at Western Province Cricket Club in the lee of Table Mountain in preparation for the first match against our hosts, Western Province CC. The first team meal of the tour saw the tourists take maximum advantage of the favourable exchange rate and Major Harry Pilcher attempt to eat half a cow. He lost the competition but won the respect of his team from the off.

The first game, but a stone's throw from Newlands, saw a typical Guards performance of decent bowling and not enough runs from the top order (less 66* from Capt Jonny Olley, CG). Built by the Dutch East India Company between 1666 and 1679. the Castle is the oldest existing colonial building in South Africa. It was used as a prison in the Second Boer War and is dripping with history – a wonderful place for us to have a beer and see some of the Grenadier memorabilia including a large Queen Victoria Royal Cypher Reversed and Interlaced. The Commanding Officer of The Cape Town Highlanders will be attending celebrations for Her Majesty this year where we intend to reciprocate his generosity. The next day saw a trip to Cape Point and a picnic in a local vineyard. To round off the day, the Club was hosted by a long-time friend of The Household Division, Charles McGregor, for a Braai and cocktails at his house Brogo in Bishopscourt; it was a good day.

On Thursday 14th January we travelled to Stellenbosch to play at Groot Drakenstein CC, the oldest grass wicket

THINKING OF LEAVING A LEGACY TO THE REGIMENT?

It's as straightforward as including a simple sentence in your will or adding a codicil.

In most cases, the first priority of members of the Regimental family will be close relatives and friends. However, many people also leave gifts to charities, known as legacies, in their wills.

Through its work with the Battalion, the Association and the Colonel's Fund, the Regiment qualifies as a charity. So a legacy can be left to the Regiment, the Colonel's Fund, or the Regimental Association.

There are three types of legacy you can leave.

- **A fixed sum of money** [Pecuniary] This is the simplest option.
- A percentage of the net value of your estate [Residuary]
 A residuary legacy means you can leave a set proportion of your estate to the Regiment after all the other beneficiaries are taken care of.
- Individual possessions [Specific] This could be typically land, property or shares.

If you're not sure about what kind of legacy you would like to leave to the Regiment, please talk to your solicitor who will be able to advise you further.

If you have already made a will but now want to leave a legacy to the Regiment, you can make an addition or change it without rewriting your current will. This addition is called a codicil and either we or your solicitor can provide you with a form of words.

Tax benefits

If you leave a legacy to the Regiment, its value will be deducted from your estate before inheritance tax (IHT) is worked out. In some cases leaving a legacy may help bring the total value of your estate below the taxable threshold (£325,000 for 2013-14). Gifts to the Regiment made up to seven years before your death may also qualify for exemption.

The Regiment is proud of its tradition of taking care of the extended regimental family. The two world wars of the last century made great demands on its charitable funds and the deployment in Afghanistan necessitated the introduction of the Colonel's Fund. The future, as always, is uncertain and the need to care for the welfare of members of the Regiment and their families will remain as important as ever.



1st Battalion Grenadier Guards, Posting to the Southern Cameroons, May-October 1961 by John Gibson

John Gibson is a former Grenadier Guardsman, who served with 1st Battalion in the British Southern Cameroons (since Cameroun) from May to October1961. The battalion arrived just after the plebiscite when the Southern Cameroons had voted overwhelmingly to be united with the Cameroun Republic rather than Nigeria. The Battalion's job was to prevent rebellion in the neighbouring French Cameroun Republic spilling over the border. His book is an eyewitness account of this tour when communist influenced terrorists were conducting raids on plantations, assaults on Gendarmerie posts, ambushes, and attacks on missions and villages from across the border with the Cameroun Republic. During his time in West Africa he took



over 100 photographs. The book will be keenly read by former members of the Household Division involved in its post-war operations and anyone interested in the 'stepping stones to independence' of former British colonies.

The King's Company Role on The Final Journey of The Unknown Warrior

On the night of 10th November 1920, the remains of the Unknown Warrior arrived at Victoria Station. A single unidentified serviceman, he represented all those whose bodies were missing in the Great War. A guard was mounted on platform 8 by 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards consisting of one Sergeant, three Corporals and twelve Guardsmen of the King's Company commanded by Lieutenant Philip Gregson Ellis. The scene was described by the correspondent of The Times as follows:

"The carriage, with its small shunting engine came in very slowly. The few civilians who awaited its coming on the platform took off their hats. The Grenadier Guards drawn up at the end of the platform saluted. There was a great silence....one heard a smothered sound of weeping. The smoke in the roof bellied and eddied around the arc lamps. The funeral carriage stopped at last."

The ceremony of changing the guard with the guard on the train was enacted and the keys of the van handed over on an almost empty platform, as the public were excluded from the station. The disparity in height and style of drill between the two guards was noticeable. The King's Company posted two sentries on the platform outside the van resting on their arms reversed. They were relieved every half hour throughout the night.

On Armistice Day at 9.30 am, the bearer party of eight Guardsmen from 3rd Battalion Coldstream Guards

removed the coffin from the van and a Union Flag, steel helmet, webbing belt and bayonet were put on it. It was then placed on a gun carriage drawn by six black horses. The procession through London via the Cenotaph to the last resting-place in Westminster Abbey was led by the massed bands of the Brigade of Guards and the Scots Guards pipers. Dense silent crowds lined the streets.

Within the Abbey, the choir and congregation were accompanied by the band of the Grenadier Guards. The final hymn was Rudyard Kipling's Recessional, including the line: Lest we forget- lest we forget! The grave was filled with earth from the French battlefields. Standing guard over the tomb on the day of its dedication in the Abbey were Sgt Alfred Fasham MM and LCpl Horace Stafford of the King's Company, both six foot five inches in height.

Floreat Etona!

Ploreat Etona!' (May Eton Flourish) was painted in 1882 by Elizabeth Thompson, Lady Butler, one of the greatest military painters of the 19th Century. The painting depicts Lt Robert Elwes, Grenadier Guards, at the battle of Laing's Nek on 28th January 1881, during the First Boer War. He is shown shouting at another old Etonian, Lieutenant Monck, Adjutant of 58th Regiment, whose horse had been shot, "Come along Monck! Floreat Etona! We must be in the front rank!" He was shot and killed immediately afterwards while Monck survived. The Queen's Colour of the 58th can be seen in the background, the last time a battalion carried its colours into action.

Following the Boer declaration of independence for the Transvaal in 1880, the British suffered a series of defeats attempting to regain the territory. At the outbreak of war, Elwes was seconded from 3rd Battalion Grenadier Guards to 58th Regiment and appointed ADC to Major General Sir George Pomeroy Colley, Commander in Chief of Natal. On 10th January 1881 Elwes left with the British Natal Force led by Colley into Transvaal to relieve the garrison in Pretoria, which was short of food and ammunition. On the

morning of 28th January, Colley tried to force a way through the Laing's Nek Pass in the Drakensburg Mountains.

The Boers, under command of General Joubert, had about 2000 men in the area with 500 defending the heights above Laing's Nek. Colley unusually directed five of his staff, including Colonel Bonar Deane, who commanded the Natal Defence Force, to accompany the 58th Regiment. At about 10.40am, Deane was ordered to lead 58th up the hill. When they reached the top of the ridge the Boers opened with volleys of well aimed rifle fire. Deane gave the order to fix bayonets and charge. His horse was shot but he continued on foot shouting out that he was alright. Again he was cut down and his Orderly Officer, Lt Edward Inman, 60th Rifles, a member of Colley's staff, was shot dead beside him. Just behind Major Higeston, now commanding the 58th, urged his men forward until he too was mortally wounded. Major Poole and Elwes, both of Colley's staff, were killed at the same time. Colley had lost seven officers, 77 men killed and 110 wounded. The Boers had 14 killed and 27 wounded. He withdrew his force to Mount Prospect to await reinforcements.

Inman had been commissioned from the ranks, a rare promotion in those days. He enlisted in 19th Hussars and was promoted to Troop Sergeant Major. Six years later he

was commissioned as a subaltern in 10th Hussars from where he exchanged into the Grenadier Guards, then finally the 60th Rifles. Colonel Henry Davies, commanding 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards, wrote to his father, the Rector of St Mary Magdalene Church, Newark, "I can assure you that his brother officers in the Guards have sincerely regretted his death as a good friend as all know that the army has sustained a loss by his untimely end, and as I feel quite certain there was no better or more gallant officer among the subalterns of the British army".

Deane, Inman, Higeston, Elwes and Poole are all buried in the Mount Prospect Military Cemetery. Colley was killed a month later at the battle of Majuba Hill, which ended the war, and is also buried there. 'Floreat Etona!' was exhibited at the Royal Academy Summer Exhibition in 1882. The British army had been deeply affected by the defeat and wanton loss of life and similar sentiments were endorsed by contemporary critics in their

reviews of the painting. The Illustrated London News for example quoted Marshal Bosquet, the French divisional commander, on the charge of the Light Brigade, "C'est magnifique, mais ce n'est pas la guerre".


Letter to Mr Dolby, Editor 'Journal of the Brigade of Guards'

The Castle, Cape Town, 21st February, 1881.

Dear Mr Dolby,

As any details of poor Elwes' death will be of interest to you, I send you the little I know, together with a rough sketch of the position of Lang's Nek. The ascent of the Table hill was very steep, but fairly out of fire except from the conical hill to the right near where a few Boers were placed. The fire on reaching the top, however, was very heavy, and at a range from 100 to 200 yards. Elwes was with the 58th when they breasted the top, and with Deane, Poole and Inman, they were all killed almost immediately. after reaching the summit. A private letter which I have just received from Mount Prospect cap says, "Poor Elwes behaved thundering well; he ran in among the Boers, and loosed off his pistol at them. He was almost at once shot down." My correspondent goes on to say that the Boers are fortifying the Nek, and he expects that the troops have a heavy job before them to take it.

What Ensign William Barton, 1st Foot Guards, Saw and Did at The Battle of Waterloo

The story of Waterloo has been often told, however eye witness accounts are of particular interest. William Barton, who had carried the King's Colour of 3rd Battalion Grenadier Guards at Quatre Bras, was well placed to describe "what I actually saw or did" in the centre of a four deep square with the unfolded Colour still in his grasp when "this slaughtering business began".

Prince Jerome Bonaparte, Napoleon's brother, and his Corps attacked the orchard and farm of Hougoument while the battery in front exchanged heavy fire with the French artillery. Behind, Barton's square was: "receiving the balls and shells, twelve men at a time being wounded and two or three blown up in the air. Captain Colquitt took up one live shell and threw it out of the square." Soon after, the great French cavalry attacks of the afternoon took place against the British squares. "They might just as well have charged a wall, though nothing could have been more dashing on their part, officers in front to attract our first fire. We told our men to fire low and first dismount them, then with their cuirasses and big jack boots they were sure to stick in the muddy field and be knocked over with ease, so after four desperate charges those who could disappeared and we had time to breathe."

The orchard at Hougoument had been lost and Lord Saltoun and the light company rejoined the battalion just before the Imperial Cavalry of France came on again. "I

unfolded again my ColourbutAdjutant Gunthorpe called out to fold it up again. Next to me stood Pardoe, we both looking to the men's firing and keeping well locked up, and thus we beat the cavalry again, though they brought up at the end Infantry and the balls whistled about us profusely. To my great grief one hit poor Pardoe in the forehead; he dropped on his face and spoke no more!"

After the enemy retired, Barton took Ensign Pardoe's sash, watch and valuables and delivered them to another officer, who was a relation of his. He had enough to carry already through the wet beaten down cornfields. Of his six colour sergeants only two were left. Pardoe's blood–stained coat was left lying on the ground. A Sergeant recorded that a brother NCO picked up the coat and waved it, cheering on the men, saying: "While the officers bleed we should not reckon our lives dear."

3rd Battalion was then moved up nearer the ridge of Hougoument and subjected to concentrated fire from Napoleon's artillery. "Then we were ordered to lie down and so fatigued were we that some of my men were snoring,

fast asleep." The French Imperial Guard had been retained fresh and in reserve all day: edged forward by Napoleon for the final blow which the elite of the Grand Army, so far uncommitted, was intended to make decisive at about seven o'clock in the evening. "When I was outside the wood at Hougoument before the action began," said Lord Saltoun to one of Wellington's staff, "I saw a column of men, as far as I can guess, about 5,000 to 6,000, go into the hollow opposite; I have kept my eye on this spot all day, and have never seen them come out yet." And Wellington brought up his glass and called "By God, he is right. They are coming out now!"

"Later up came the brave Duke calling out to us "Now Guards at them

again." And what did we behold? A large mass creeping up the incline in serried Battalions with huge fur Grenadier caps screaming out, "Vive l'Empereur en avant en avant." We formed a line of four deep, the first rank kneeling, the second also firing, the third and the fourth loading and handing on to the front and kept up such a continued fire into mass of heaped up Grenadiers, who were also taken in flank by General Adam's brigade and artillery, so that none ever reached the top."


As the French Grenadiers breasted the ridge the line of Guards stood up; the accurately controlled volleys and the irresistible charge that followed ended twenty years of war and destroyed the Empire which Napoleon, with so much violence and suffering had achieved.

For Barton, the victory had hung on a thread and those still alive had drawn a prize in the lottery of warfare. "Our Cavalry was sadly cut up; we had but four hundred left of our men, lost killed and disabled, all our field officers at Quatre Bras; ...it took five days to clear away the wounded. After a night's sleep on the floor of the hayloft of Belle Alliance he felt fit enough to look after his men. "But what a sight to behold – heaps of bodies of all nations, dead and wounded – suffering! Asking for help and water lying about for miles around! This was worse than the battle itself and I was glad when the orders came to fall in and march off after the enemy. My horse had disappeared, so I had to trudge along."

On 29th July 1815 the London Gazette announced:

"His Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve of the First Regiment of Foot Guards being made a Regiment of Grenadiers and styled "The First or Grenadier Regiment of Foot Guards in commemoration of their having defeated the Grenadiers of the French Imperial Guard upon this memorable occasion."

Capt William Barton retired in 1833 and died on 14th May 1874 in Jersey aged 78. His account of his military career ends: "Those who ever take the trouble to peruse these few lines, must be indulgent, for I was never a Writer or ever wished to publish; it may only interest some of my old brother officers who may have shared the perils and duties, and loves his Regiment as I did, and still do."

LCpl Nigel Ngwenya



Lord Nigel Ngwenya was born in South Africa but brought up in South London started boxing after joining the Grenadier Guards. As a soldier over 91kg he was not short of opposition in the Grenadier Guards Inter Company Championships. Ngwenya won the Grenadier Guards Super

Heavyweight title in his first season and successfully defended it in his second. As a Novice boxer he was entered with a nine wins from nine bouts record in to the Army Individual Championships in June 2014, a competition in which he maintained his 100% win record.

LCpl Ngwenya joined the Army Boxing Team in August 2014 as a Super Heavyweight. He had only just reached the bout limit to be categorised as Class B boxer (11) he was also only 95kg so relatively light in Super Heavyweight terms. He was selected to represent the Army and the Combined Services in the National Novice Championships at Class B in Oct. He surprised everyone across the South of England when he comprehensibly beat hot favourite for the overall title Tom Welsh in a qualifier. He quickly went on to beat the London Super Heavyweight too and qualified for the final in Sunderland on 1 Nov, his opponent weighed in over 25kgs heavier and with greater experience. With speed, power and aggression overwhelmed the boxer from Hull and the Army were proud to have a National Class B Super Heavyweight Champion.

LCpl Ngwenya had a record of 14 wins from 14 bouts and the queue to take the 100% record from him was growing, yet he maintained his perfect record through to the New Year and began to focus on the Inter Services. He was a comfortable winner again against the best the Royal Marines could throw at him. He would progress to the Elite Finals tournament in Liverpool's Echo Arena (a three day tournament to find the best boxer at each weight in England).

The reputations and records of the opponents in the draw were impressive. He bullied his way through a tough quarter final on the first day, and then his semi final against the England Finalist and former international Declan Fusco. Ngwenya had reached the final of the most prestigious tournament in the country, his opponent was 125kg GB representative Fraser Clarke. The bout went the distance but at last Ngwenya had met his match, and

lost on a unanimous points decision.

Ngwenya had gone from Inter Company boxing to the England Elite Final in a year a massive achievement.

Ngwenya has since had three GB Boxing training selection camps and awaits a call up at Heavyweight. He is a huge talent, and was crowned the Army Sports Rising Star of 2015, being ranked 5th in Great Britain.

LCpl Robert 'Money' Punter



Larmy in late 2011 and completed training at ITC Catterick before joining Nijmegen Company. He joined The Inkerman Company in May 2013 where he was given the nickname Money.

Lieutenant Colonel P H Haslett MBE

Philip Haslett, who has died aged 88, was born on 7th January 1927. He was the only son of Sir William Haslett, a specialist in

mental and neurological disorders. His mother was a niece of Sir Claude 'Crawley' Champion de Crespigny. He was educated at Marlborough and commissioned as a 2Lt in the Grenadier Guards on 28th September 1945. In 1949, he commanded a platoon on operations with 3rd Battalion, patrolling against bandit gangs around Sungei Besi during the Malaya Emergency. He returned there some 45 years later and asked the friendly villagers how they had got on since the Emergency. They cheerfully replied that they were too young to remember it. In 1954, he was selected to be Adjutant of Mons Officer Cadet School. He returned to 3rd Battalion as Support Company Commander in 1957, during the Cyprus Emergency. The tour involved cordon and search operations in Nicosia and the surrounding area. Over several months, the Army had reduced 16 terrorist gangs to five; 69 EOKA had been killed and rioting and looting virtually stopped. In 1959, he was appointed Captain of the Queen's Company at Tidworth before deploying to Bamenda in the British Cameroons in West Africa in 1961. A terrorist camp was located on the border with the French Cameroons. Philip personally led a close reconnaissance patrol before the camp was successfully attacked and two terrorists killed with the loss of one Guardsman. He was appointed MBE in the New Year Honours 1962. After flying to Libya on a training exercise and a tour in Wuppertal, BAOR, as Senior Major 2nd Battalion, Philip was appointed Brigade Major of Berlin Infantry Brigade in 1965. He was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel and appointed Commanding Officer 2nd Battalion at Chelsea Barracks in 1969. In August the Battalion was unexpectedly placed on Spearhead and deployed to Northern Ireland where there was a real danger of civil war. Both in Londonderry and Belfast the soldiers were at first made welcome, but it did not last. However, at the end of the five month tour it had not proved necessary to fire CS gas or live ammunition and tension gradually subsided. This was in no small part due to his calm and sensible leadership. After further appointments in the Ministry of Defence, he retired from the Army in 1977. In retirement he was an enthusiastic bridge player, gardener, ornithologist and traveller. One notable journey involved trekking in the Himalayas and visiting the base of Mount Annapurna. A kind and considerate man, he was President of the Weybridge Branch of the Royal British Legion and a volunteer guide at Painshill Park. He attended Her Majesty's Grenadier Day at Buckingham Palace on 26th

June 2013 and, together with other former Captains of the Queen's Company, was presented to the Queen. A charming, unassuming and delightful Grenadier with an excellent sense of humour who, for an obvious reason, was affectionately nicknamed 'Chrome Dome'. A lifelong bachelor, he is survived and much missed by his three sisters, Mary Camilla, Rosemary and Barbara, their children, his many friends and his devoted carers, Melissa Phillips and Karen Fourie, who attended to him over the last few years.



Major Lord Brassey of Apethorpe OBE IP DL

David Brassey, 3rd Baron, who has died aged 82, was born on 16th September 1932. He was the son of Lieutenant Colonel Lord

Brassey MC TD, 2nd Baron Brassey of Apethorpe. He was educated at Stowe where he excelled on the athletics track. His Housemaster wrote 'There are few people whom I would rather have with me in a physical crisis, provided he understood what the crisis was about'.

He was commissioned from Eaton Hall Officer Cadet School into the Grenadier Guards in September 1951 and posted to 3rd Battalion in Egypt before transferring to 1st Battalion in 1953. He qualified on the 120mm anti tank gun course. Later another officer introduced himself as 'Richardson, 3rd Tanks.' to which David replied 'Brassey, Anti Tanks.' A Jaguar owner, motoring enthusiast and regular supporter of the Monte Carlo Rally he was appointed the Battalion's Motor Transport Officer in 1955. He was on the Staff of HQ London District from 1959–61, Second in Command of the Junior Guardsmen's Company at Pirbright in 1962 and then Company Commander with 2nd Battalion in BAOR, Caterham, British Guiana and Windsor.

During 2nd Battalion's tour in British Guiana from June 1963 until March 1964, David commanded Headquarter Company throughout considerable racial strife between Africans and Indians. In January 1965, he commanded a Grenadier detachment from the Battalion in the State Funeral of Sir Winston Churchill. Later that year, he flew to Libya on a desert training exercise. In all his command appointments David showed dash and imagination being more at home in the field than in the office.

He succeeded to the title in 1967 and retired from the Army as a Major the following year. His activities in retirement were characterised by his pursuit of perfection coupled with a strong sense of public duty. In 1970 he was appointed Justice of the Peace and became Chairman of the Corby Magistrates and a prison visitor at Gartree Prison where he was popular with both the staff and inmates. He ensured that their requests and requirements

were carefully considered and was much respected for his compassion and ability to always remain fair in his dealings with others. He was appointed OBE in 1994. He was made a Deputy Lieutenant of Northamptonshire in 1972 and Vice Lord Lieutenant in 2000.

He loved fishing and shooting and was a keen gardener and ornithologist. He bred a wide variety of ducks at Apethorpe and was a trustee of the Slimbridge Wetlands Centre for Birds. Its founder, Sir Peter Scott, was astonished to find that David could not only identify almost all resident British birds, but also their equivalent Latin names. David was a clear and independent thinker with an idiosyncratic sense of humour which concealed a loyal and generous spirit. The large attendance at his thanksgiving service adjacent to the lake at Apethorpe included many former Grenadiers and reflected the widespread affection he was held in. He is buried in his favourite wood nearby which he maintained so beautifully.

His love of the countryside and everything in it was second only to his love and devotion to his family and friends. He married first in 1958, Myrna Baskerville-Glegg. She predeceased him in 1974 and he married secondly Caroline (Midgie) Evill in 1978. She survives him with their two daughters, Zara and Chloe, and the son of his first marriage, Edward, who served as a Captain in the Regiment and succeeds to the title.



Major HW Freeman-Attwood

Warren Freeman-Attwood, who has died aged 91, was born at Dalhousie, India, on 20th September 1923. He was the son of Major General H A Freeman-Attwood DSO, OBE, MC and educated at

Marlborough. He was commissioned into the Grenadier Guards and was posted to 6th Battalion in Tunisia in 1943. In September, the Battalion landed at Salerno and Warren fought in the first battle of Monte Camino overlooking the road to Naples. To bullets and shells were added the discomfort of frostbite and exposure. In December, when the Battalion descended from the mountain after nine days, it could only muster 263 men for duty. After a second battle, the mountain was captured. Warren was the sole platoon commander to emerge unscathed from both battles; however the loss of so many friends remained etched in his memory.

His platoon's next task was to dominate no man's land and patrol up to the River Garigliano. Fortunately a fat pig wandered into the anti-personnel minefield and provided a welcome Christmas dinner. In January 1944, in an attack on the high ground across the river, the Battalion captured 78 prisoners and 12 machine guns. Warren recommended Harry Butcher, his orderly, for a Military Medal, which he was awarded for his single handed capture of a machine gun. In March, Warren and 16 other officers were transferred to 5th Battalion as part of the 6th South African Armoured Division. By October, they were opposite Monte Sole carrying out close contact night patrols.

Shortly afterwards, Warren and others who had seen continuous fighting was selected to go to South Africa for two weeks. The object was to inform the South African public what their Division had achieved in Italy. Warren returned to the Battalion as it fought its way northwards. On 1st January 1945 he led a fierce raid against Casa Fudella and was Mentioned in Despatches. In 1945 he moved to HQ 1st Guards Brigade for the final battle across the River Po. At the end of the war, Warren transferred to 3rd Battalion and then 1st Battalion on active service in Palestine followed by a tour in Tripoli. In 1950 he attended Staff College. He took part in the Lying in State of King George VI in Westminster Hall and was posted to the Canal Zone in Egypt on the staff of HQ 32 Guards Brigade. He was appointed Regimental Adjutant in 1958 and retired from the Army in 1960.

He joined the Stock Exchange until 1984 when a brain haemorrhage caused him to retire. For many years he helped run the 5th and 6th Battalions Officers Dining Clubs and in 1995, played a leading part in establishing the 6th Battalion's Mareth Cross at the West Door of the Guards Chapel. Warren was admired throughout the Regiment for his bravery in battle, intelligence, dedication and ability. He had a wonderful sense of humour and wide interests from opera to shooting.

His first marriage, in 1947, to Elizabeth Mostyn-Owen was dissolved. His second, in 1960, was to Marigold Wedderburn, who survives him with their son, Professor Jonathan Freeman-Attwood who is Principal of the Royal Academy of Music, a son and daughter from his first marriage and two sons and a daughter from her first marriage.



Major J D Makgill Crichton Maitland

David Makgill Crichton Maitland, who has died aged 89, was a scion of the Earls of Lauderdale. He was born on 10th September 1925, the elder son of Colonel M E Makgill Crichton Maitland CVO, DSO, DL

and his wife the former Patience Fleetwood Fuller. His father commanded 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards during the Great War and was Lieutenant Colonel Commanding the Regiment at the beginning of the Second War. David was educated at Eton and, following in his father's footsteps, was commissioned into the Grenadier Guards in May 1944.

He was attached to the Irish Guards before joining 1st

(Motor) Battalion in BAOR in April 1945. In 1946, he was granted a Regular Commission and joined the newly formed Guards Independent Parachute Company as the first platoon commander of 1 Platoon in 1948. The Company was responsible for the path finding role - the securing, marking by visual and radar means, and defending parachute dropping zones. David attended a three month Pathfinder Course at the United States Airborne School in Georgia and obtained an excellent result.

In 1951 he spent four months in BAOR with 2nd Battalion and then joined 3rd Battalion in the Canal Zone. In 1952, David served on the staff of HQ 1st Guards Brigade during a period of intensive internal security operations and was rated by the Brigade Major, David Fraser, (later General Sir David Fraser VCGS) to be a first class staff officer and problem solver. The following year he returned to 3rd Battalion as commander of Headquarter Company during its handover in the Canal Zone and subsequent move to London. In 1956, David deployed with 3rd Battalion, first to Malta during the Suez Crisis, and then to Cyprus during the emergency as 3 Company Commander. The tour involved cordon and search operations in the Troodos Mountains. Over several months the Army had reduced 16 terrorist gangs to five, 69 EOKA had been killed and rioting and looting virtually stopped. In all his commands David led by example showing a great deal of imagination and dedication.

He retired from the Army as a Major in 1957 to live at and run the Estate of Houston in Renfrewshire to which he devoted his considerable energies and expertise. He greatly improved both the estate and the farm bringing them into today's world. He had a strong sense of public duty and was much liked and respected throughout Renfrewshire where he was President of SSAFA. He was appointed a Deputy Lieutenant in 1962, Vice Lord Lieutenant in 1972 and Lord Lieutenant from 1980 until 1994. He appreciated all aspects of the countryside and its future management and handed the estate and farm over to his son in 1995.

He married first in 1954, Jean (Patsy) Creagh, only daughter of Major General Sir Michael O'Moore Creagh KBE, MC and Lady O'Moore Creagh She predeceased him in 1985 and he married secondly Mary Ann Curzon (née Ogilvy) in 1987 and moved to Daluaine in Aberdeenshire. He continued to assist with SSAFA and laid a wreath at the Rhynie war memorial every Armistice Day in his Guards Independent Parachute Company beret, as well as attending the annual Regimental Remembrance Day in London in his bowler hat. Combining humour with ability he was a delightful and popular Grenadier. David loved shooting and he and Mary Ann enjoyed entertaining their friends and family at Daluaine as well as trips to London to the ballet and theatre. She survives him with his son, Mark and daughter, Mary from his first marriage.



Capt A M Denny

Anthony (Tony) Denny, who has died aged 93, was born in London on 2nd March 1922. He was the eldest son of John and Eileen Denny of Horwood House, Buckinghamshire. His father served with 2nd Battalion Grenadier Guards in the Great War. On 25th

January 1915, he and three other Grenadier officers on temporary attachment to the Scots Guards were hit by a shell that exploded in their trench. The first three were killed and his father was severely wounded. After he recovered, he became ADC to the Viceroy of India and went into the family business E M Denny and Co Ltd (bacon curers). Tony was educated at Eton and, following in his father's footsteps, was commissioned into the Grenadier Guards in September 1941.

He joined 3rd Battalion which sailed from Scotland to Algiers in November 1942. In December, the Battalion crossed into Tunisia. During the main battle of the Tunisian campaign – the Battle of Djebel Mansour, on 4th February 1943, Tony commanded his platoon in the attack on Djebel Alliliga by 2 Company. Three German machine guns were disposed of and the east shoulder of Alliliga captured at a cost of fifty per cent casualties, including one of his fellow platoon commanders killed and the other wounded. On 20th March, he commanded a successful fighting patrol to the village of Grich el Oued and captured four German deserters, who provided invaluable information on the strength and disposition of the Garrison.

Complete victory came with the joining up of First Army with Eighth Army and the final battle leading to the fall of Tunis in May. The Battalion spent June and July bivouacked by the sea at Sousse awaiting orders to embark for Italy. As a relief from camp life, Tony led his platoon on an expedition to the Atlas Mountains to shoot Mouflon (a wild sheep with large inward curving horns). On returning from his initial trip into the mountains, he found the whole platoon had decamped to the nearest bordello, from which he had to extract them.

In Italy on 28th May 1944, during the attack on Monte Grande, Tony's platoon was hit by a salvo of shells on a narrow track and suffered twenty casualties. He rallied the survivors but they were too few to carry out their original task. On 29th June, he carried out another successful fighting patrol along the steep and thickly wooded banks of the Tiber and captured four Germans in a farmhouse. He was promoted to Captain in September 1944. He remained with the Battalion until returning to England in May 1945 and was Mentioned in Despatches in November. Tony was next posted to 2nd Battalion and joined the Control Commission of the British Military Government in Germany. He was released from the Army in July 1946 but for years afterwards suffered recurrent

nightmares from his experiences during the war.

After the war he went to Art School in Bristol intending to become an architect. Instead he worked for the family business which had been started 135 years earlier by his Great Great Grandfather. In January 1955, he married Daphne Speir, daughter of Kenneth and Henrietta Speir, at the Brompton Oratory. The family lived in London before moving to Hattingley in Hampshire where Tony was able to indulge his passion for fly fishing on the Itchen. He loved to travel and was actively involved in charitable work for the Provision Trade Benevolent Institution, which helps those who have worked in the provision trade and find themselves financially distressed. He is survived and much missed by his wife, Daphne, their three children, Melissa, Richard and Jane and their six grandchildren.



Capt Sir John Lambert KCVO, CMG

John Lambert, who has died aged 94, was born in London on 8th January 1921. He was the son of Colonel R S Lambert MC, who was

Regimental Adjutant of the Grenadier Guards and Brigade Major of the Brigade of Guards. He was educated at Eton, the Sorbonne and Trinity College Cambridge where he joined the Officer Training Corps. After Brigade Squad and Sandhurst, he followed in his father's footsteps and was commissioned into the Grenadier Guards in March 1941.

He joined 3rd Battalion in Scotland and became Grenadier Liaison Officer with HQ 1st Guards Brigade. The Brigade sailed from Scotland and joined 1st Army in Algiers in November 1942. John, as Liaison Officer, was allotted a motor-cycle and, being fluent in French and German, was able to liaise both with the French forces and interrogate German prisoners. In December, the Brigade crossed into Tunisia and had their baptism of fire around Medjez-el-Bab. The Brigade nicknamed 'the Plumbers' were called upon to plug leaks as the Germans attempted to break out from encirclement.

John rejoined 3rd Battalion as Intelligence Officer in the pursuit of the Germans over the Kasserine Pass towards Tunis. The Battalion captured Hammam Lif on 8th May 1943 and he was sent by Colonel Algy Heber-Percy to detain the Bey of Tunis (whose neutrality was suspect) in his Summer Palace. While John was holding the fort with the Bey in a throne room strewn with broken glass, a Lieutenant Colonel and Major arrived from 1st Army Headquarters with instructions to take the Bey off to Tunis in their truck. After tricky negotiations, conducted by John, the Bey and his entourage were allowed to leave

in the state Daimler instead; and John returned to the Battalion with a photograph of the Bey, a Citroën car and two bottles of champagne (courtesy of the Tunisian Interior Minister). During the final days of the advance he commandeered a Volkswagen driven by the ADC to General Graf von Sponeck and was involved in the surrender of hundreds of Italian and German prisoners during and after the final battle leading to the fall of Tunis.

In February 1944, the Battalion landed at Naples and for ten days, John commanded 3 Company in the battle for Cerasola high above the snow line in the mountains. The Battalion continued to fight its way northwards and after the capture of Perugia in June he was put in charge of training Grenadier replacements for the considerable number of casualties which Battalions had been having in Italy. In March 1945, he rejoined 3rd Battalion, which led Eighth Army in the crossing of the River Po, and took over command of 1 Company. He was in Cividale on VE Day trying to keep the peace between the Italians, Tito's partisans and Serbian Chetniks and in Austria until August 1945 when he returned to England in the belly of a Liberator bomber with a South African crew.

He was demobilised as a Captain and joined the Diplomatic Service as Third Secretary at the Hague Embassy. It was here that he met and enjoyed dancing with Audrey Hepburn and they remained good friends. During his distinguished career he held appointments in Damascus, Belgrade, Manila, Geneva, Stockholm and Vienna. His penultimate appointment was as Minister and Deputy Commandant in the British Military Government in Berlin from 1974 until 1977. He was appointed CMG in 1975. His last appointment was Ambassador to Tunisia from 1977 until 1981. During the Queen's State Visit in 1980 he was able to show Prince Philip the Grenadier and other Household Division memorials in St George's Church. He was appointed KCVO in 1980.

He was the first Director of the Heritage of London Trust and was its President until his death. His many interests included the arts, music, tennis and golf. His book 'A Memoir 1921–1948' was privately published in 2015. He married Jenny Urquhart in 1950. She predeceased him in 2013, and he is survived and much missed by his son, Andrew, two daughters, Victoria and Rosamund, and his four grandchildren.



Capt John Lenaghan

Capt John Lenaghan died after a Short illness on 23rd August 2015 at the age of 56.

Born in Bushey on 7th April 1959, he enlisted into the Regiment at ACIO Wembley on 22nd July 1976.

On completion of his basic training he was posted to the 2nd Battalion in April 1977, where his ability to spell and write his own name was soon spotted! Various clerical appointments went hand in hand with rapid promotion, namely: LSgt (Records NCO), Guards Depot/Regimental Headquarters, December 1983-September 1986, followed by a very short stint as the Orderly Room Clerk, 2nd Battalion until May 1987, ORCSgt/ORMS 1st Battalion May 1987–November 1991 and finally reaching the pinnacle of the Clerical world by becoming WO1 (Superintending Clerk), which unbeknown to anybody at the time, would be the Regiment's last.

By now with a very much depleted staff, his last acts in this appointment were to oversee the drawdown of the 2nd Battalion and the handover of Soldier/Officer manning from Regimental Headquarters to the 1st Battalion, when the newly formed Adjutant Generals Corps became responsible for providing clerical support. After taking up his commission in 1996 as the Families Officer of the 1st Battalion, he was posted in April 1999 to ITC Wales as the SO3 G1/G3. It was in January 2001 whilst serving in Wellington Barracks with the Scots Guards as their Human Resources Officer that he was offered employment as The National Events Manager The Royal British Legion, an offer which was too good to refuse and John retired on 11th February 2011.

However, it is for his time spent at the Union Jack Club that he will be fondly remembered by so many, having led the Club and its staff for eleven years in his roles as Club Manager and Deputy Chief Executive – positions that earned John great praise and huge respect from everyone who knew him, especially the Members.

Apart from his love of football (being a keen Chelsea fan), his passion for marathon running was well known and it was during his first London Marathon that John's mischievous sense of humour came to the fore, when after completing 25 miles, he turned round and said "come on Juppy let's get a sprint on, only a BFT left to do". I have never forgotten seeing that huge grin across his face as he waited for me at the finishing line. There are many more such occasions that I could mention especially at The Annual Sergeants' (past and present) Club Dinner, and but for his untimely death he would have been the Club's President in 2016, a position I know he was greatly honoured to undertake and to which he much looked forward.

He was held in high esteem by his superiors but more importantly greatly admired by those who served under him, from which firm friendships grew well beyond Regimental life. John very recently decided to move to Gateshead and before his premature demise, was probably one of the smartest men to ever work at Tesco – his legendary tie and cuff-link collection would give any well known department store a run for its money!

Although he will be sadly missed by his devoted family, I know they have so many happy memories to treasure, as do those lucky enough to count themselves among his close-knit group of friends.



Capt J R H (Jinks) Wills

Dad was born in Longparish, Hampshire on 27th January 1955. As was to be a theme of his life, Dad thrived in the pursuit of outdoor sports

winning his colours at Eton as part of the Shooting Eight, Boat Club and remarkably for a wet-bob, the Ramblers. Although less successful at hunting (where he and his pony were banned from the local hunt for being 'a disruptive influence on the other horses') shooting was to be a mainstay of his life. Fiercely proud of his family it was natural that he would want to follow his father, uncle and brother into the Grenadiers.

Sandhurst was a very happy time for him, maybe rather too good a time. Standing in front of the Company Commander with another Officer Cadet they were informed, "Gentlemen, it has come to my attention you are living beyond your means!" Their mess bill was more than their monthly pay. Colonel Harry Scott, a lifelong friend of Dad recalls many stories of their time spent there. Most poignant to him was the fact that he, Simon Ledger, Simon Stephenson and Dad all met their future brides while they there, a bond that has lasted since their teenage years.

Dad's first tour of duty with the regiment was in Hong Kong with the Second Battalion. This was a mixture of hard slog when conducting border patrols in the jungle balanced with the fun of being based in Hong Kong's vibrant settings. Two stories stick from this period; one that is probably not for publication featuring a Guardsman coming a cropper while trying to protect his personal affects from leeches and another more printable involving a patrol to stop Chinese immigrants on the mud flats. As the poor potential illegals hared it away across the mud the Company Commander (un-named) bellowed, "After them lads, follow me!" before leaping off the hard standing, and with his kit on ending up to his chest in mud. There was much merriment as a land rover was called for to haul him out. Dad adored his time at Shornecliffe teaching on the Junior Leaders course. He, Simon Stephenson, and Bernard Hornung lived at Number 1 Sea View Terrace: the fact that the main windows looked straight onto a brick wall lead them to call themselves the 'No View Club', a photo of which still lives on in Foot Guards messes around the UK. Save tours, his beloved dog Nada went everywhere with him, "she never got used to helicopters" I remember him telling me. According to friends he was particularly pleased with the way that when she sat her feet angled apart perfectly, only a Guardsman could appreciate that!

Undoubtedly the experience that matured Dad the most in the Army, other than marrying Mum, was his time spent in Northern Ireland. Dad deployed on quite a few tours with the most notable being his time as the Second Captain in Crossmaglen where he was Mentioned in Despatches (and

also as was the custom grew a rather reproachable moustache). This was as a result of an adventurous day out chasing gunmen across the Irish border as part of Op WOTAN, in which he masterminded an enormous 'come on' when the Queen's Company patrolled very openly in XMG covered by covert OPs on the immediate outside and by the SAS on the border. Col Alexander Heroys, his Commanding Officer at the time recalls listening to the excitement on the Battalion net as he spotted an illegal Vehicle Check Point as he was flying overhead. He persuaded the pilot, who happened to be the Commanding Officer of the AAC Regiment, to give chase despite them being shot at for daring to do so. They followed the fleeing suspects across the border into a farmhouse and then directed the Irish Guardai onto the location. Having done so, they were required to return across the border. It was a courageous thing to have done.

One of those things that set the Foot Guards apart from other units is the close relationship they have with the Royal Family. Dad served as Temporary Equerry to HRH Prince Philip and also spent time with the Queen Mother recalling one time when, while wearing a great coat in the Chapel Royal she informed him that he looked rather flushed, and that he shouldn't stand on ceremony and should remove his coat. Dad feigned decorum in terror of exposing the Mickey Mouse t-shirt worn underneath.

Dad's last hurrah was as Subaltern for The Queen's Birthday Parade of 1983 when he carried out his duties perfectly, as with everything he did. He later confided in my brother and I that just before the parade his brother teased him, "Just don't drop your sword!" He worried about it all day and when it came to my turn on the parade last year (although less immaculately than Dad's execution of it) he forbade my younger brother from telling me the same!

Although Dad left the Grenadiers in 1984 the Regiment has continued to play a huge part in his life, very much embodying the spirit of 'Once a Grenadier'. When the opportunity came to help raise money for The Colonel's Fund by cycling from Wellington Barracks to Waterloo he jumped at the opportunity. Many a person will have, as I do, happy memories of charging across Western Europe alongside Dad, more than one young officer was tested on the Belgian hills by the sight of Dad careening past them! Dad was inspirational to all in his wicked humour and hyena like laugh. Many a person has commented that to sit beside Dad was to feel like the funniest and most interesting person in the room, regardless of age or station. A true countryman Dad was never happier than with shotgun in hand and dog at his heel be it the finest shoot in the land or a morning of walked up. Generous to a fault you would never seem him smiling more than on the very rare occasion you were standing beside him and managed to wipe his eye.

It has always been said of Dad that he had three things in life that he truly treasured; his family and friends, his shooting, and his time as a Grenadier. Well before his proper time, Dad passed away peacefully in his sleep at home in February 2015, surrounded by friends and family having shot the last day of the season. Few could imagine a better way to go.



Regimental Sergeant Major H Chaffer MM

Regimental Sergeant Major Henry (Jack) Chaffer, who has died aged 91, was born in army quarters at Kingston-upon-Thames on March 6

1924 The son of a regular soldier, Jack falsified his age to join the Grenadier Guards at 16, and suffered his first setback on sentry duty at Windsor Castle, when he was presenting arms as King George VI walked past with his dogs. As it was a hot day, and he was wearing a steel helmet and respirator on his chest, the King suggested that he might be more comfortable if he stepped back into the shade of a buttress. Chaffer's commanding officer was unimpressed by his account, however, and the young man spent three days in the guard room until an equerry confirmed his story. He received a week's leave in compensation.

Six months after marrying at 18, he sailed to North Africa as part of the newly raised 5th Battalion for the Tunisian campaign. He landed at Salerno for four months of bitter fighting, and then was sent to Naples for a rest, only to be ordered to join the amphibious assault on Anzio. Promoted Lance Sergeant, Chaffer was subsequently wounded and spent six weeks in hospital. Upon recovery, he was sent up to the Gothic Line near Florence where, on December 2 1944, he took part in a moonlight attack on a strong German position in the foothills of Monte Sole.

The Grenadiers were 70 yards from their objective when they came under a hail of machine- gun fire in which the officers and seven members of Chaffer's own platoon were casualties. Seeing his platoon commander lying seriously wounded, Chaffer rushed forward into a minefield and brought him back to safety. Assuming command of the platoon, he quickly recognised the precariousness of their position. By making use of the high ground they occupied to provide covering fire on to the enemy positions, however, he was able to extricate his men without further loss or injury.

The citation for his Military Medal described how "the courage, coolness and efficiency of this lance-sergeant has been notable throughout the whole of the present campaign and was, on this particular occasion, outstanding and a great inspiration and encouragement to his platoon." Chaffer returned home in August 1945 and after three weeks was posted to Germany as a colour sergeant. He was demobilised when 5th Battalion was disbanded, and worked briefly at the Hawker aircraft factory in Kingston.

When the Territorial Army was reformed in 1947, however, Chaffer immediately joined the local 'terrier' battalion of his father's regiment, the East Surreys, and was soon made an honorary member of the sergeants' mess. He spent so much of his spare time with them that it was suggested he should rejoin the regular Army and was signed on for a full 22 year

engagement. He became recruiting sergeant at Great Scotland Yard, where he had first enlisted, and served in Malaya, Aden and Cyprus. At one point he was provost sergeant, the position his father had also held 20 years earlier in India.

On retiring in 1976 from the Queen's, as the regiment had by then become, he joined the Tower of London where, at more than 6 ft tall and kitted out in Tudor state dress, he made one of the more impressive Beefeaters at the Tower, while his politically incorrect accounts of English history made him a favourite with the crowds. Jack Chaffer's wife, Doll, predeceased him in 2011. Their son and daughter survive him.

LSgt E C Ross 2626319 Grenadier Guards

Eddie Ross enlisted as a regular on 18/09/44 one day before his 17th birthday having lied about his age. Following training he was posted to

Germany, several weeks after the German surrender. He was then posted to 3rd battalion destined for the invasion of Japan but prior to departing UK the Japanese surrendered.

In October 1945 the 3rd Battalion were sent to Palestine. As a young Guardsman during early operations he was successfully mentored by veterans of Tunisia and Italy. The next 30 months were spent on operations against Arab and Jewish terrorists. The Battalion returned to UK in 1948 but within a few months were again on active service in Malaya. The next 7 months were spent on operations in the jungle against communist bandits.

He returned to Windsor in 1948 performing public duties, including the King's Birthday Parade 1950. Despite his active service background he enjoyed public duties. In 1950 he was posted to 2nd Battalion in BAOR serving alongside his younger brother Len. Plenty of banter between Eddie, LSgt in a Rifle Company, and Len, Guardsman in the MT platoon.

Upon leaving the Army on 20/09/52 Eddie worked, until retirement, as an aeronautical fitter in the aircraft industry. Eddie served from 1971–1992 as a Captain in the Army Cadet Force as OC Welwyn Garden City Detachment. He passed on his military experience and enthusiasm to several generations of Cadets, many of whom joined the Army.

His wife of 50 years, Jean, predeceased him in 2001. He passed away peacefully aged 87 years following a long illness. Always a proud Grenadier to the end, his stories of his time in the Regiment will be missed by his family. He leaves behind his brother Len, son Mark, grandsons Chris, Dave and Tom and his great grandson Austin.



Lord Montague of Beaulieu

Edward Montague, 3rd Baron, who died on 31st August 2015 at the age of 88, was born on 26th October 1926. He inherited the title and the Beaulieu Estate at the age of two on the death of his father, the second Lord Montague,

a motoring pioneer. His education at St Peter's Court, Broadstairs was interrupted by the Second World War when he was evacuated first to Devon, and then Canada, where he attended Ridley College, near Niagara Falls. Aged 16 he returned to Britain and went to Eton. Called up for military service, Lord Montague was commissioned into the Grenadier Guards in September 1945, and joined 3rd Battalion in Palestine where the British were mandated to keep the peace between the Jews and Arabs, while preventing bloodshed and destruction. He was promoted to Motor Transport Officer and involved in intensive internal security operations.

On leaving the Army as a Lieutenant in 1947, he went to New College, Oxford. In November 1947, he took his seat in the House of Lords and in January 1948 made his maiden speech on Palestine. He pointed out that in the past year "our soldiers have always behaved with the most remarkable restraint in the face of every provocation." On his 25th birthday in 1951, he took over the running of the Beaulieu Estate. The infamous Montague trials in 1953 and 1954 resulted in him being charged with homosexual acts, which were then illegal. He pleaded not guilty, but was given a 12 month sentence. In prison he worked in the tailors shop supervised by two prison officers, who were both former Grenadier Guards NCOs. On his release, his brother officers, led by Robin Leigh-Pemberton, later Lord Kingsdown gave a lunch for him in Soho. He immediately went about rebuilding his life and developing the estate.

He returned to the Lords in 1958 and was a regular participant in political life. When the 1999 reforms were implemented he was one of the Conservative hereditary peers elected to remain. By the mid-Sixties, Beaulieu was attracting over half a million visitors a year and in 1974, the National Motor Museum was awarded the prestigious National Heritage Museum of the Year. Having played a major role in the Historic Houses Association he was appointed first chairman of English Heritage in 1983. His candid autobiography, Wheels within Wheels, was published in 2002. He wrote: "Of all the institutions with which I have been connected, the Guards have always been the most conspicuously loyal." He was a Vice President of the Wessex Branch of the Grenadier Guards Association, and member of the 1st Guards Club.

In 1959, he married Belinda Crossley with whom he had a son, Ralph, and a daughter, Mary. The marriage was dissolved in 1974, after which he married Fiona Herbert with whom he had a second son, Jonathan, in 1975. He is survived by Fiona and his children. His elder son, Ralph succeeds to the barony.



Len (Tiger) Payne

2622889 Len Payne died suddenly in his sleep on Monday 21st October 2014. We were unable obtain any information about his funeral but we knew he was cremated and his ashes scattered at Pontefract Castle.

He was known as Tiger because of the Tigers head tattooed on his chest. Tiger joined the Regiment in the 1940s and was sent to Germany. He served in Egypt, Tripoli, Cyprus,



The Cameroons, returned to Germany and then finally in Pirbright. He was a great Master Cook, his buffets were famous, the likes of which will not be seen in the Regimental Messes again. Nothing was too much trouble for him and he would help anyone who needed it. Tiger had a great sense of a humour, a quick wit and many funny stories to tell. When he left the Regiment he became a chef for the Prison Service.

He was a member and great supporter of the Caterham Branch for many years and became Chairman of the Branch in 1999 when **John Mayes** left to move to Sussex. He kept the Branch going with the other officials, until the falling attendance made it unsustainable. We had our farewell Dinner and Dance on the 19th November 2011.

Tiger was instrumental along with others in arranging for a tree to be planted in the Arboretum and a bench to be put on the sports field in Caterham Barracks with two plaques; one for the Caterham Branch of the Grenadier Guards Association and the other reading 'Donated by the Caterham Branch in Honour of All Guardsmen who Marched Through Caterham'.

On 16 March 2015 former members and friends of the Caterham Branch, some 20 in all, met at Caterham Barracks to say our farewell to Len. Arrangements had been made by **Robert Baynham**, formerly Welsh Guards and a stalwart of the Branch, for a plaque for Tiger to be put on the bench we bought when the Caterham Branch was closed. It reads; 'Tiger Payne Grenadier Guards passed away 26 10 2014'. Robert provided two bunches of flowers – red roses and yellow daffodils. We had a superb trumpeter who played Abide with Me, Last Post and Reveille. We also had a tot of wine each and made a toast to Tiger.

The bench is on the road side by the playing field, which the developers have kept and is worth a visit if you are ever in the area. The whole development has been well done apart from the garish Tesco Supermarket just inside the gate where the Guardroom used to be. What a shame they never had a statue of a Guardsman instead of the awful pillar block. Tiger was a very proud Grenadier and will be greatly missed by his many friends.

Household Division Charity Short Break at Highbullen, Devon: October 25–28 2015

The 2015 October half term saw the Household ■ Division Charity arrange a short break for a group of eight bereaved Household Division families at a Country House Hotel in north Devon called Highbullen. This was a consequence of The Major General and trustees of the Household Division Charity along with Regimental Adjutants of the Household Cavalry and Foot Guards Regiments collectively recognising the importance of promoting positive support to such families. The Household Division Charity endeavoured to extend an invitation to all bereaved Household Division families with children; a key aim of the initiative being to provide an on-going support network for the children of deceased service personnel, many of whom had been unborn, or very young, when their father had died and who may have never met other children whose parents had also died in service. Huge recognition and credit must go to Mrs Sheenie Chant who started the initiative originally several years ago until handing over responsibility for this year's event, adopted so generously by Mrs Phyllida Middlemiss and who has written the following short report.

The October half term initiative grew out of a Household Division welfare weekend that had taken place at Centre Parks in Wiltshire in 2014; one of several previous attempts at getting a group of widows and children together arranged by Mrs Sheenie Chant. On that occasion, the group of about 20 adults and children only met up with each other on the last afternoon; nonetheless, the adults present were struck



by the instant bond that the children seemed to forge and there was definitely a special feeling in the way that they all played together and looked out for each other in the huge Centre Parks swimming pool. At the end of that afternoon, I was stunned when my 11 year daughter, busy arranging knives and forks, started a conversation with a 9 year old by asking her, "How old were you when your daddy died" - and then they both proceeded, quite happily and without any awkwardness, to talk about their fathers whilst they laid the table together. The trust and acceptance in that exchange was enormous and in marked contrast to the endeavours that my three children make to avoid talking about their father in their everyday life. As they have explained to me many times; I don't like saying that Papa is dead because it's awkward and people don't then know what to say to me. I recently discovered that my 10 year old son - always looking for practical, low emotion solutions - often simply says that Daddy is away on business. And my youngest daughter, on being asked at the start of the school year to write about herself and her family, wrote "My Dad doesn't live with us any more". In short, it's hard being different.

Following on from Centre Parks, the general feed-back provided to the Household Division Charity was that the idea of a short break was sound but that it could be more 'intimate' than the experience provided by Centre Park, where we were guests with several hundred others. Further, since some of the families had benefited greatly from working with a national bereavement charity called Winston's Wish, we would be missing a trick if we didn't include a counselling element. Finally, it seemed that the group should not just be aimed at widows and their children, but that it should be widened to include any family grouping where there were children of deceased service personnel; i.e. grandparents in care of the children and families where there had been a subsequent re-marriage. A plan was hatched, with the icing on the cake being that all the Household Division Regiments contributed funds to ensure that there was minimum cost to families whatever their experiences.

So it was that, during the 2015 October half term, a group consisting of 6 women, 2 men and 16 children aged from 14 months to 16 years old met up at the Highbullen Golf and Country Club in North Devon for 3 nights of ... well, we weren't quite sure, to be honest, but we all knew that: it looked like a nice hotel on the edge of the moors; children (and dogs) were definitely welcome; Winston's Wish, funded by Help for Heroes, were coming for a day of voluntary activities; there was an indoor pool and table tennis room that should keep the children busy (important given the vagaries of the British weather); the Household Division Charity were kindly laying on an adult dinner in the very good restaurant (and baby sitters to sit on the children whilst we enjoyed ourselves); and that if it didn't work out, there were plenty of activities in north Devon with which we could fill our days.

We needn't have worried. The hotel couldn't have been more welcoming, and with all the staff really working hard to make us feel at home, it didn't take long for the children to gel. Within a very short time, the pack of 16 (most of whom had not met before) were buzzing around the grounds playing billiards together, rugby on the golf course (sorry), endless monkeying around in the swimming pool, walking the dogs in the woods and really looking out for each other. Joyce and Lorraine, aged 1 and 3 and Joseph and Johnny, 3 year old twins, stole the show and had everyone running around after them. But all the children had a huge amount of fun, whatever their age, and the older teenagers even went off one afternoon to 'surf the wave' in Croyde before returning to a delicious, and very good humoured group supper and yet more billiards – a game that seemed to appeal to all ages. Hannah and Sophie Thorneloe have since made these lovely observations:

"I enjoyed it because I felt that everyone there was my friend and I didn't have to explain why my daddy wasn't there, because sometimes that's really hard. The Winston's Wish team let us go and talk to them about what we felt like and if they could help. They gave me "A pocket full of plasters", which is a really good little book, which tells me what to do when you are in a muddle and I don't know what to do about not having my Daddy there to help me. I made really good friends with everyone and would l love to see them again."

"When everyone had arrived it was quite late, but we all had one big great game of the night playing `it` in the dark with all our new friends. Soon everyone was playing together like they had known each other for ages. We took part in a workshop with Winston's Wish which made me feel that our family is a team. The weekend made me feel far more confident about being a family of 3 not 4 and that this is OK."

And, of course, as any parent knows, a happy child means a happy adult. The following are extracts from letters received after the weekend and sum up our positive experience perfectly. Thank you so much to the Household Division welfare arm and to William Style in particular, for making this possible.

"It was good to meet other parents and their children, and having time to chat about things in a calm atmosphere. The boys especially enjoyed meeting new friends and talked about this for several days after we left. The session with Winston Wish was also very productive for us personally and gave us lots of ideas about how we can support the boys as they get older. The hotel was comfortable and the food excellent."

"I arrived home from our break away at High Bullen, feeling calm and quietly re-assured we are still moving ever onwards in the right direction. Winston's Wish was a positive move. It was good to spend time in the company of others, swapping news, information and sharing our lives and experiences. Thank you for making this possible."

"We had a lovely relaxing time at the hotel and were made to feel very welcome from the minute we arrived. All the staff were lovely and I particularly liked the opportunity for a meal with Adults only. I have never left the children with anyone other than family before so my daughter was especially anxious about the baby sitter coming, but all the girls who came to babysit were amazing with the children.



When I returned they had played monopoly, watched TV and dressed the dog up in a tutu! She loved it and asked when they could have a baby sitter again. This was a real treat to me so thank you all involved for our lovely relaxing retreat."

"I wanted to write to thank you so very much for all your time and effort organising the few marvellous days in Devon. I cannot tell you how much it meant to me. I'm not sure if I have reached a stage where I am able to see beyond the pain of it or whether it was the group, the place, the freedom of time to share without constraint, I don't know but I came away so much stronger and more at peace. Knowing and feeling just how much suffering there has been within our group touched me deeply. I think it is so important to be connected and so hope this initiative will continue. I am sure all will agree; we really need this. The activity was eye opening, rather distrustful from bad experience but I got so much out of that. Thank you so much for organising that too. The children had a wonderful, wonderful time and looking at them all, what fabulous young people!"

The Colonel's Fund At Work

I would like to thank the Grenadier Guards Colonel's Fund, along with the Regimental Casualty Officer Matthew Ellmer, whose support and hard work have been invaluable.

I sustained a serious injury to my leg whilst on a tour in South Armagh in 1991. I was part of a multiple of Grenadiers attached to the 2nd Battalion Coldstream Guards. After six months in Musgrave Park Hospital, Belfast followed by seven months at RAF Headley Court, I was returned to the Battalion only to be medically discharged the following year in 1993.

Since my discharge my injuries had started to deteriorate,

and over the past six years I have undergone several bouts of surgery and had more metal work put in to my ankle. The nerve damage to my lower leg and ankle is still extensive, so earlier this year I was offered a below the knee amputation.

After speaking to BLESMA, I was put in contact with an Army Surgeon, Lieutenant Colonel Cubison, who'd been using a pioneering new device at RAF Headley Court. This device (an exoskeleton), had

been developed by the US Military to negate the need for below the knee amputations. It had been used so successfully at Headley Court that the team using it wanted to roll it out to veterans and civilians who were seeking amputation for lower leg injuries. Lieutenant Colonel Cubison felt I would be an ideal candidate; unfortunately, the device isn't available on the NHS and not available to veterans. As it costs approximately £5,000 and the vital rehab could only be carried out by the team at Headley Court, and Headley Court don't offer rehab for veterans, I felt my only option was to go for the amputation.

Lieutenant Colonel Cubison suggested seeking the vital funding from one of the various military charities and as I wasn't aware of the Colonel's Fund I didn't know where to start. I was explaining this to a mate on Facebook, Justin Lee, who told me about the Fund and that I should approach the Regiment. After calling Regimental Headquarters and speaking with Major Andy Green I was put in contact with Matthew Ellmer; within a week Matt was sat at my kitchen table asking how the Regiment could help.

Thanks to the Colonel's Fund and Matt Ellmer the device and the private rehabilitation programme (costing a further £2,500) have been fully funded. I have now completed the rehabilitation programme which was two weeks of hard physiotherapy and I'm now getting back to some previously enjoyed pastimes and even looking forward to a return to work after 6 years of ill health.

Thanks to everyone who has raised money for the Fund, it really has had a massive impact on my life.

The Finest ACF Regimental Visit: Shropshire ACF – May 2015

During Whitsun, members of Shropshire Army Cadet Force spent six days with No 2 Company, 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards. The visit was designed for the Cadets to gain an insight into the life of a regular soldier in the Grenadier Guards, which the County is affiliated to. The visit also served to strengthen the partnership between Shropshire ACF and the Battalion.

From dawn till dusk, the Cadets were active and on occasions were privileged to see sights not usually afforded to the general public.

Day 1 – Central London. The first day was spent in and around Westminster; centre of the UK government and historic landmarks including the Houses of Parliament, Big Ben, the Treasury and Cabinet Offices, Horse Guards Parade, Trafalgar Square, and Buckingham Palace which is next door to Wellington Barracks, home to Nijmegen Company Grenadier Guards. The group also visited the Imperial War Museum that has endless exhibits that provide stories and experiences of how modern war and conflict has shaped peoples' lives. The

Cadets were overwhelmed by their experience in the centre of London and the hustle and bustle of the city. Previous visits to London had been to a specific location by coach and limited to the views through a window.



Day 2 – Ceremonial and Operational Duties. The second day was spent with No 2 Company and commenced by looking at their preparations for the State Opening of Parliament, specifically the marching and drill sequences for this event. Mid-morning, the Cadets were briefed and then completed a short lecture on Fire and Manoeuvre. After completing the theory, the Cadets travelled to the training area and demonstrated their newly developed understanding of the subject. All of the Cadets thoroughly enjoyed the demonstrations and being given the opportunity to participate themselves, under the watchful eye of regular soldiers from the Battalion.

The Cadets walked taller and prouder from the training area, each of them having their own stories of how they spotted the enemy first!

Day 3 - Ceremonial Duties at Windsor Castle. No 2 Company's Second in Command was the Officer of the Guard at the Castle. The Cadets were given a guided tour of the Guardroom, introduced to some of the soldiers and then taken on a guided tour of the Officers flat in the castle which is steeped in history. The Cadets enjoyed listening to the stories behind the carvings on the wall and laughed at the fact that, regardless of their regiment, every Officer that stays there sleeps in a bed made by the Grenadier Guards! The Cadets



then walked round the castle where they spoke to ex Grenadiers who now work as guides. The Cadets enjoyed talking to them about their experiences and the guides in turn showed their appreciation by letting them enter the exhibits without queueing.

Day 4 – Fieldcraft. On day four, the Cadets joined elements of No 2 Company on the ranges. They completed concurrent activities based around Fieldcraft and then rotated around the SA80, the GPMG and the LMG. All of the Cadets successfully hit the target with each of the weapons although some slightly better than others. Firing a burst on the GPMG turned the smallest cadet into a giant and she walked away with a huge grin on her face. After a very quick turnaround, that evening we travelled to the Tower of London to witness the Ceremony of the Keys. Again, this is something that not many people get to see and the Cadets listened carefully to the information being given and then stood silently throughout the ceremony. This was another highlight that the Cadets identified as being something they would never forget.

Day 5 – Drill. The penultimate day was spent at Lille Barracks again to complete a drill session under the command of one of the Platoon Sergeants and the Cadets were subsequently 'dismissed' from the Battalion and their visit to the Grenadier Guards.

Day 6 – Ceremonial Duties. The final day was spent witnessing the Major General's Review on Horse Guards. The Cadets watched the event from St James Park, stood with The Kings Troop, Royal Horse Artillery. The Cadets

learnt a lot during their visit and experienced even more. It is these experiences that they will continue to talk about for the rest of their ACF careers if not their lives. Whether it be the Ceremony of the Keys, firing bursts on the GPMG and LMG or conducting contact drills with regular soldiers, I am sure that this group of cadets will confirm that their week with the 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards has been one of the best, most action packed and enjoyable weeks of their time with Shropshire Army Cadet Force and an experience from which unforgettable memories have been forged.

Battlefield Touring with a Dirty Grenade (Part V)

It has been several years since the Wellington 2 Waterloo Charity Cycle Ride and I had still been unable to journey any closer to 'my' beloved battlefield. During that momentous charity event I was bewildered to see and meet some of the 'old and bold', dressed in full bib and tucker, on the P&O ferry crossing to Calais. A few were familiar faces whom I'd had the honour of serving with many moons ago. But what puzzled me, at that time, was what were they doing there? They obviously weren't cycling, being clean, polished and pressed, rather than the hot, sweaty, aromatic, aching Lycra clad entourage I was accompanying. They looked clean, relaxed and enjoying themselves on the short Channel crossing with no hint of trepidation at the two day slog across Flanders Fields.

I was to find out later that this was the first 'Cockpit Grenadier' battlefield tour organised by RHQ to coincide with the W2W ride. I was to have joined this group for a day on completion of the 3 day cycle before returning to the UK, on a guided tour of Waterloo. Alas the fates intervened and I was prevented from doing so by unseen hands (you'll have to go back through your old 2014 Gazette to find out why and read the full story). Suffice to say, despite having been enthralled with Napoleonic history since a small boy, I have never, ever managed to get to that monumental battlefield – Waterloo; so deeply ingrained in the Grenadier persona and psyche!

But then, thanks to Major Andy Green (and others), I possibly had another chance. There was to be another 'Cockpit Grenadier' battlefield tour; and this is the best bit, in the same year as the 200th Anniversary of the Battle. The fates were now surely smiling?

Places booked, bags packed, passports checked, history revised, maps gleaned, I was ready. This time nothing was going to stop me. I even dragged my 84 year old mother along (she would only have sat at home and watched 'Strictly'!). I had hoped to bring along my 18 year old nephew, whom I nearly recruited into the Regiment, but he began his first year at University on the day we departed, studying . . . Military History!

As on the W2W Cycle ride I (we) checked into the excellent Union Jack Club. Tea & Coffee would be served in the Officers Mess Ante-Room at Wellington the following morning and we had to be seated on the coach and ready by 0800 hrs. I didn't want to take chances so a night in London seemed prudent.

Bags were loaded, toilets visited, bums placed on seats and the pax list checked. The guard on the West Picquet gate attentively hauled the gates open, and we were off in a trice, dashing into the morning rush hour. At last I was on my way...to Waterloo! But then I hadn't reckoned on

the organisational skills of the Association Treasurer. A quick tour of Parliament Square and we were suddenly heading back down Birdcage Walk, through the West Picquet Gate and back to the Officers' Mess. Had the fates intervened again? No. It seems he had left his mobile phone behind.

Then we had another problem. None of us are getting any younger and no sooner had the coach drawn to a halt inside the gate when there was a steady stream disembarking back into the Officer's Mess to answer the call of nature or to take a quick fag break. Major Green had the unenvious task of shepherding and cajoling us back into our seats. But achieve this he did and once more we were on our way.

Next stop Dover! Well, Thurrock Services actually, where we were to pick up Mrs Alison Cooper, our tour guide's wife. Soon we were onto the ferry at Dover and then speeding past French and Belgian Fields towards our first Hotel in Waterloo! At last I thought – nearly there! There was the Lion Mound (speeding past), there was Quatre Bras (speeding past), there was the town sign, 'Welcome to Waterloo' (speeding past), there was the town sign saying 'Thanks for visiting Waterloo' (speeding past)! I think I broke into a cold sweat and glanced over at Major Green. I'm sure to this day he had a wry, evil smile on his face. Thankfully I was assured that we were staying in Waterloo and that we would be visiting the battlefield the following day.

We met our excellent guide, Graeme Cooper, formerly Green Howards, on arrival at the Grand Hotel from where he had been conducting a previous tour along with our driver Richard Towns. At this point let me say that Richard deserved a medal as he managed throughout to swiftly negotiate our coach through traffic, down boggy country lanes, the narrowest of village streets and over variable terrain that would have made even the hardiest APC driver think twice. After settling in and freshening up we RV'd in the bar for Champagne and nibbles, introduced ourselves, became acquainted and settled into a superb dinner, Graham then outlined the following day's itinerary.

The following day was overcast with a hint of rain. Graham gave us a chronological tour of the battlefield starting at Quatre Bras and ending at Hougoumont via the Lion Mound. On climbing the latter and having been relatively fine all day, we were hit by a vicious squall that had us huddled together on the leeward side of the Lion Statue dressed in whatever warm and dry clothing we could find. This was quite poignant given that in the lead up to the battle the combatants had had to endure far worse conditions and for even longer.

We toured the excellent new Museum and had lunch in the nearby Restaurant where there was an interesting interlude. One of our companions requested a Cheese and Onion Sandwich. The waitress hearing 'sandwich', promptly provided the only 'sandwich' on the menu...a Beef Wellington Sandwich. "No, No, No" our compatriot declared "a CHEESE AND ONION Sandwich". Again our waitress scurried away to return with more Beef Wellington sandwiches. With growing ire on one side and despair on the other, the drama continued until it was time to leave. Suffice to say, that some went away with rumbling stomachs mumbling something about "...foreigners", the waitress was reduced to a nervous wreck and I had had my fill of Beef Wellington Sandwiches.

The end of the day was spent walking along the ridge towards Hougoumont adjacent to where Maitland's Guards had risen up out of the cornfield and defeated elements of the Imperial Guard helping to end Napoleons dreams of European conquest. At Hougoumont we held a short service and laid a wreath by the chapel in memory of the 1st Guards who fought and died between 16th and 18th June. I felt very, very honoured to be invited to read the Regimental Collect. Especially in the presence of such august and distinguished company and on such hallowed ground.

That night we were treated to a fantastic presentation by Graeme about his father; ex-Scots Guards Officer Johnny Cooper, one of the David Stirling's SAS 'Originals'. Graham enthralled us with tales of derringdo and his father's exploits in many of the far-flung corners of the globe.

The following day we were on the move. Our next stopover would be two nights in Arras. Time and space precludes listing all our 'adventures' in this article but to give you an idea of the packed itinerary here is a list of some of the sites we visited or passed on the way:

MALPLAQUET, LOOS (the Indian Memorial and Dud Corner Cemetery), LANDRECIES (where we navigated around some fences to walk around the spot where Major B GORDON-LENNOX and No's 2 & 3 Companys, 2nd Battalion held up the German advance), FESTUBERT, NEUVE CHAPELLE (where Private BARBER won his VC and Major Green showed us Private Barbers VC; for me it was moving to hold this treasured award standing on the same spot where it was won). NIMY BRIDGE (where the first VC's of WW1 was won and where our Guide had us scurrying up and down the railway embankment to get a better view, much to the consternation of his wife, the local Gendarmerie and the drivers of speeding trains!), ESCUELBECQ, AGINCOURT (not quite a Grenadier victory but a victory non the less), CUINCHY communal

cemetery (where a wreath was laid by Colonel Andrew Duncan at the grave of a relative), WINDY CORNER The Guards Cemetery where a wreath was also laid), St Symphorien Cemetery and St Ablain-St-Nazaire, Nord Pas de Calais – not only is there a huge French cemetery here, permanently manned by the French equivalent of the British Legion, but also an oval 'Memorial Wall' listing all those killed in this part of France in WW1 irrespective of nationality. I found 10 with my surname alone.

We enjoyed many other highlights including a bizarre lunch in a polish restaurant somewhere out in the Uhlu! This involved much merry-making, back slapping, fancy dress and Polish vodka. In the same restaurant I was also thanked by a bemused French family dining there. They wanted me to pass on their gratitude to the Regiment for helping liberate their country during WW1 & WW2 (particularly the grandfather who had fought with the Free French Forces in the latter conflict).

At Dud Corner Cemetery, Major Green was also kind enough to show the VC mentioned earlier to a British Family also visiting the site. Although the younger children did not seem too fazed, the faces of the adults were a different story and full of awe.

Then after a five hour delay at Calais waiting for power to be restored in the tunnel it was 'ENDEX' and we were safely delivered back to Wellington Barracks. Should there ever be another 'Cockpit Grenadier' Tour, I shall certainly get my name down for it and I would recommend it to everyone else, whether a Grenadier or not.

As always when I travel, I take a decent pair of binoculars with me (my wife complains, regularly that they cost more than her engagement ring, but that's another story) and whilst at Dud Corner Cemetery, standing on the wall that surrounds it, I had the chance to scan the vast area around it. As far as the eye could see, dotted across the countryside, were almost countless little enclaves of white grave markers or crosses, gathered together. Each one signifying a cemetery or the site of a hard fought battle. As we drove through this tiny part of Europe I was amazed by the equally vast number of markers, memorials, graveyards, cemeteries, plaques and commemorative obelisks, statues or plinths; all dedicated to different regiments, battles, nations and events. There seemed to be one every 100 yards or so. Our Regiment, formed in 1656, has spent the greater part of its illustrious history marching and counter-marching across these fields. We had laid wreaths in memory of our fallen. We had held a commemorative service. Some of our party had visited graves or memorials to family members. And to bring it all home many of the names I saw on gravestones or were named in the description of the battlefields we visited were familiar to me. I had served with many of their descendants and feel proud and humble to be associated with each one of them.

The Brookwood 1914–1918 Memorial is dedicated to the memory of more than 260 First World War servicemen who died in the United Kingdom and Ireland, or at sea, but who have no known grave. Many of the names are of newly recognised war casualties, whose details were omitted from official records produced during, and shortly after, the First World War. Readers may remember the article by Major Frank Clark about Alfred Cockerill beginning on page 78 of the 2014 edition of the Gazette.

Recollections of My Army Service

I was keen to join the army and was determined to be a front-line soldier with a first class regiment. My father had a friend who had been in the Guards and I always admired him and was fascinated by his stories. I resolved to join the Grenadiers as they were the senior infantry regiment in the British Army with a very proud history.

I joined up in February 1941 at the age of 19. You could only do this by volunteering as they did not accept conscripts. At that time the Dunkirk evacuation had already taken place, so effectively we had been driven out of Europe. Initially I reported to Chelsea Barracks but was later transferred to The Guards Depot at Caterham in Surrey.

The training was incredibly hard. There was drill every morning followed by PT. Everything had to be done in a hurry; there was always someone yelling at you and you got a real mouthful if you were slow. There was a lot of field training, going out on manoeuvres, long marches in full kit, and endurance training. On one occasion we had to sleep out on Salisbury plain in the middle of winter. We slept in our kit on the ground and I remember waking up to find my boots covered in frost. There was a lot of rifle drill and you had to learn how to strip down guns. The main machine gun in use at that time was the Bren, and we had to learn how to strip it down and reassemble it with our eyes closed.

After 16 weeks of initial training I was sent to Windsor. There was a lot more drill but it was more specific as they were assessing people's capabilities to decide what they were best suited to. In my case I was assigned to a 3 inch mortar crew. (In a battlefield situation, when mortars weren't required I served in an infantry platoon). Some others were assigned as machine gunners, anti-tank gunners etc. I eventually became part of The King's Company. This made me very proud as it was the elite company within the Grenadiers.

During my time at Windsor, I was often on guard at Windsor Castle and had an early encounter with royalty. One day early in the morning I saw a figure approaching me in an old army greatcoat. As he waved and called out "morning sentry" I realised it was King George VI and made a hasty salute. During this period I also saw a parade at the castle attended by King George and Queen Elizabeth where the then Princess Elizabeth (our present Queen) was made Colonel of our regiment. One amusing fact that I recall from my time at Windsor Castle was that whenever we were on sentry duty during the night, we had to wear carpet slippers so as not to wake the royal household, as our boots made too much noise on the gravel.

The Grenadiers were made up of 6 Battalions each of about 1,000 men, split into companies of about 100-120,

and platoons of about 30 men. Each platoon was made up of three sections under a Corporal or a Lance Sergeant. I started my army career in the First Battalion in the Guards Armoured Division which comprised a squadron of tanks (20), and a company of infantrymen. I remained in this battalion throughout the war, but after the war I went to Palestine with the 3rd Battalion.

I first saw action during the D-Day landings. My company were first-line reinforcements, which meant we were in the second wave of landings. We had to jump out of the landing craft in full battle kit into water that came up to our necks and wade ashore. It was really frightening as you could go under with every step you took, and some of the lads drowned. By this time the Germans were being driven back from the beaches and we were quickly mobilised to advance through France and engage with them wherever we met resistance.

We moved inland through towns and villages, many of which had been totally destroyed. In one major town, Caen, hardly a building was left standing. Progress was very slow as the Germans had Tiger tanks with 88mm guns. These were far superior to the American Sherman tanks that we were using which only had 75mm guns. Our own British tanks would have been better but most of these had been sent to North Africa; however, thanks to air support and superior numbers we gradually got the upper hand. One of my mates who was an anti-tank gunner actually hit a German tank straight down its gun barrel moments before it could line up its gun on his own tank. It was absolute carnage; badly burned bodies were lying in the road alongside burned out tanks and there was machine gun fire everywhere. Also, as they retreated the Germans laid mines. On one occasion I happened to look down and my foot was about an inch away from one of the metal spikes of a mine protruding from the

soil as we crossed a field. A very close call!

The Germans were ruthless soldiers and you could never drop your guard even for a moment. On one occasion we captured a German tank and whilst we were rounding up the prisoners, one of them tossed a grenade into the hatch of one of our tanks and destroyed it with all its crew. At times we even came under 'friendly fire' from our own side when they were supposed to be firing over our heads to help with our advance and got their range wrong.

My worst moment came when I was asked to lead a small party into an area where there was heavy fighting, to search for some of our lads who were missing. We entered a small gully and found 13 of our colleagues lying dead. This was sickening as many of them were good pals of mine, and one of them, a lad called Alan who was only 19, had been reading out a poem from his girl friend only the night before. The memory of that day still haunts me!

One of my proudest moments was when, after a fierce and bloody battle in which several of my colleagues lost their lives, we forced the Germans to surrender at the town of Pont-a Marcq (known to all the lads as Pontimar). The townspeople and the French Resistance treated us like heroes when we liberated their town. They brought out wine and food and there was a wonderful atmosphere of celebration. They treated us like heroes! We were so proud when the BBC World News reported on the radio that the town of Pont-a-Marcq had been liberated by a famous English regiment.

The following day we were on the move again as we continued our advance through France and onwards towards the Belgian border. We subsequently progressed through Belgium and ultimately reached Nijmegen in Holland.

We did have many light hearted moments along the way however with the locals in various towns and villages. We were always short of supplies and had many a laugh trying to barter with local farmers for eggs and cheese despite many misunderstandings due to the obvious language difficulties.

I alternated between duties between mortar crew and infantry platoon. We had to fire the mortars continuously and normally have 16 bombs in the air before the first one hit and we had to keep that up all the time. One legacy of the war for me personally is that I have been hard of hearing ever since as there was no ear protection in those days.

At Nijmegen I was involved in a major battle to capture a strategically important bridge; this was part of operation Market Garden, sometimes known as the Arnhem offensive, led by Field Marshall Montgomery. I was a Lance Sergeant at the time and was asked to lead an infantry section across an iron bridge over a ravine which led onto the main bridge. I and one of my men went ahead to recce the situation when a German machine gun opened fire on us. My colleague was hit in the temple and died immediately. I picked up some shrapnel in my back but managed to crawl off the bridge and get back to safety with bullets flying all around me. The bridge was eventually captured and became another Battle Honour for the Grenadiers, although the overall operation was not a success. They made a movie about it called "A Bridge Too Far."

Afterwards I needed hospital treatment and was flown home to England in a transport plane as all the field hospitals were full. The silence felt unreal on the journey to the hospital in England, as for a long time I had been used to bullets flying all around me and pinging off the sides of our armoured cars. They operated on me and I was eventually discharged, but after a few weeks my wound was not healing and a further X-ray revealed that I had a bullet lodged against my spine. Apparently it had flown over my head and ricocheted off an iron girder into my back at the same time as I had picked up the shrapnel wound.

I was operated on in a military hospital at Windsor and was given the bullet as a souvenir. Whilst in hospital the Queen and Princess Elizabeth made a visit to my ward and stopped to chat to me. The Queen asked to see my bullet and I was surprised that she knew it was a ricochet because it was flat on one side.

By the time I was fit to resume active duty the war was ending and I was sent to Palestine for a year. This was a very different situation, but equally dangerous as it marked the start of the Middle East conflict that is still going on. There were many attacks by militant Zionist organisations, one of which, the Irgun, blew up the King David Hotel, which was our headquarters in Jerusalem. As the attacks were carried out by civilians rather than uniformed troops, you had to be on your guard all the time as ambushes were frequent and deadly.

On a lighter note I felt very privileged to have had the opportunity to see all of the major religious sites in the Holy Land and we had some great times on leave in Beirut, which at that time was a beautiful modern city.

When I came home I was a Full Sergeant, what is known as a Gold Sergeant in our regiment. I was offered a further promotion to Company Sergeant Major, but I didn't really have the heart for it. I had seen most of my close friends killed and many of my other mates were returning to Civvy Street after the war, so I thought it was time for me to pack it in rather than make a fresh start as a peace-time soldier.

I still have the legacy of that bullet wound as I now have severe arthritis and spondylitis of the lower spine. Having said that, I never regretted joining the army and would do it again if I could turn back the clock, and all my mates would tell you the same. The camaraderie was fantastic. I had some great mates and made many lifetime friendships. You always knew your mates would never let you down. I have kept in touch with many of them over the years. Many of us were members of the local branch of the Grenadier Guards Association, and we would often reminisce about the old days.

There is not much glory in war. The reality is brutal and bloody. They were terrible times in many ways, but the sense of comradeship and the pride we all felt at having served our country never diminished. Sadly most of my pals have now passed away, but I will never forget them or the times we shared together.

On Saturday 20th June 2015, a number of our members were privileged to have been invited to attend the Waterloo Commemorations at Canterbury Cathedral. Following a service in the Cathedral, we witnessed a re-enactment of the Waterloo Dispatch that the Duke of Wellington wrote immediately after the battle. History records that he wanted to get the good news of victory over Napoleon to the Prince Regent and Government as soon as possible, so in the immediate aftermath of victory on 18th June 1815, Wellington's challenge was to get the news to London. No problem in an era of 24 hour news, mobile phones and tablet computers, but with no such technology available to him, he wrote a dispatch and assigned Major Henry Percy of the 14th Light Dragoons to take it to London.

On 19th June 1815 the 30 year old, who was Wellington's only aide-de-camp to emerge unscathed from the battle, tucked the dispatch into a purple wallet and set off. He rode to Ghent, Bruges and Ostend where he boarded the Royal Navy sloop HMS Peruvian. Halfway across the Channel, the wind dropped and Percy and his naval companions, including Peruvian's captain James White, boarded a gig – a small boat – to row ashore, eventually landing at Broadstairs.

Percy then found a horse-drawn post-chase – or carriage – and rode through Canterbury, Faversham, Sittingbourne and Rochester, reaching London at 10pm on 21st June. He first went to 10 Downing Street before going on to 44 Grosvenor Square where senior politicians in the Cabinet were having supper.

He burst into the room, declaring "Victory, Victory, Napoleon has been beaten!" From there, he went to St James's Square to present Wellington's dispatch to the Prince Regent and the Prime Minister Lord Liverpool. Percy was instantly promoted to Colonel. A tearful Prince

said: "It is a glorious victory, but the loss of life has been fearful and I have lost my friends." The Waterloo Dispatch is therefore an important part of Kentish history because of its momentous journey through the county.

For our July 2015 meeting we had a change of venue and held it at the Black Horse, Pluckley. Paul Murray (1st Bn 1981–94, Recce Platoon) and his partner Sarah are the landlords. After the meeting Paul gave a very interesting brief on the history of the pub, plus details on some of its ghostly inhabitants and paranormal activities. Pluckley is recorded to be the most haunted village in England and The Black Horse is the most haunted pub in Kent. Those readers that watched the 1991 to 1993 comedy/drama 'The Darling Buds of May' will have known the pub, in the series, as the Hare and Hounds and it was noted as the favourite pub of David Jason's character, Sidney Charles 'Pop' Larkin. As he said "in my mind there was no other regiment worth joining, and they have now become my family". When **Capt Farrell** asked for volunteers for this event he felt he just couldn't say no. He was extremely smart, very well presented, polite and chatted to everyone. He posed endlessly for photographs, not only with **Ted** and his guests, but also when accosted by other residents (and the staff) in the care home. He was a credit to the regiment.

Ted or Curly, as he was known during his service days, was born in Lincoln on 9th November 1915. He left school aged 14 and his first job was as an errand boy for a local grocer, following that he worked for a furniture store, helping with deliveries and sometimes fitting carpets. In

1934 on a works outing the coach stopped in front of Buckingham Palace and on seeing the Guards he thought he would like to be a sentry. He did not hesitate to enlist and by 10th April 1935 he had joined the 2nd Battalion and was doing his first Public Duties, less than a year from his first sighting of the Guards. His service took him to Egypt from 1936 to 1938. After the outbreak of WWII he went through the BEF campaign ending with the evacuation at Dunkirk, and then after D Day on to the liberation of France, Belgium and Holland with the Guards Armoured Division, where he was a tank fitter with No 3 Squadron. He was demobbed in March 1946 having served 10 years and 327 days. His discharge papers read: 'A good and reliable man who has given excellent and loyal service in all conditions. He has never spared himself and has proved himself to be completely reliable, clean, sober and honest'.

Two of his most memorable and proudest moments were marching behind the Regimental Band into Buckingham Palace forecourt and entering Brussels to liberate the people and being kissed by Nuns!

Ted wrote an article for the 1991 issue of the Grenadier Gazette (page 40) about the 'Worst Day of his Life', which included his evacuation from Dunkirk. In September 1991, in Heesch, Holland there was a naming ceremony of street to be called 'Grenadierstraat'. Regimental Headquarters organised a four day visit for this with many veterans taking part, a full report is in the 1992 Gazette (page 72). At the end of the ceremony the veterans were to make their way back to the Town Hall for the evening's entertainment by coach. However, our Ted, not recognising this 'word of command' immediately formed up the men in three ranks and marched them smartly back to the Town Hall, much to the delight of the locals.

After the war he worked for Lord and Lady Monson in Burton by Lincoln as chauffeur and gardener. He actually chauffeured them to London for the coronation in 1953. A few years later he went to work in Louth where he stayed until he retired at the age of 65.

When on leave in 1938 he met his wife, Sylvia (known to many as Sue) at an M&S Christmas party and they began courting the following year. They married in 1941; sadly Sue passed away in 1997. He continued living alone until in April 2014 when at the age of 98 he decided to move into the care home, which, independent as always, he chose himself and then told everyone else. He also took the decision at that time to finally give up driving!

We had a wonderful afternoon; **Ted** spoke to everyone present and also gave a small speech. We would like to thank **Ted's** family for allowing us to be part of these celebrations and also to **Capt Ian Farrell** and others within the Regimental system that made our surprise guest possible. Always a staunch supporter of his local branch, the Lincoln Branch has copies of Branch meeting minutes back to the late 1940s in which **Ted** is mentioned. This just leaves us now to wonder – is he the oldest serving Grenadier – or do you know better?

Douglas Vernon 1931–2015

Douglas Vernon was born on 25 June 1931 and was educated at the King George V Grammar School, Southport. He enlisted into the Regiment in 1950 and his qualities were soon recognised. After basic training he reported to the 3rd Battalion in Chelsea Barracks prior to their



deployment to Egypt where he was first promoted whilst serving in the Intelligence Cell.

On the Battalion's return from Egypt he was promoted to Gold Sgt and posted to RMA Sandhurst as a Sergeant Instructor in Gaza Company and quickly established himself by winning the Junior Drill Competition. He also became noted as a fine water polo player, coached the swimming team and was also a member of a very dominant Pace Sticking team. It was at this period that he met up with Laurie Jeffery; the start of a long friendship and with whom he would serve at a later period in his career.

After his service at the RMA he applied and was accepted

for a commission at Eaton Hall. He was eventually commissioned into the Royal Army Ordnance Corps and saw service on secondment in the Oman from 1958–60 and Sierra Leone in 1961. 1964 saw him serving in Uganda where he met up once again with Laurie Jeffery who had been seconded from the Regiment as Regimental Sergeant Major in the fledgling Ugandan Army. There they had the unenviable task of 'kitting out' a former ruler of the country, 'King Freddie' the Kabaka of Buganda.

His service ended in the late 1960s after the Ugandan episode when he retired to set up a book business in Lewes. In 1986 he moved to Shrewsbury where he set up a very successful print and picture framing business.

Douglas joined the Shropshire Branch of the Association and took over as Branch Treasurer in 1989, a position he held for several years until moving to Eastbourne and eventually retiring in 2007; even though quite a distance to Shrewsbury he and his wife **Suzan** continued to attend many Branch events.



Our Company Sergeant Major was 'Chick' Hayes and our 'Pay Bloke' was the great Syd Dowland.

Many years ago a photograph appeared in the Gazette of LSgt Whitehead and LCpl Jim Eastwood on Barrack Guard; I took that photograph. So I can boast that I served with several 'famous' men during my three years.

Dear Sgt Broomes,

I've been watching television and reading newspapers regarding the 1st World War, 2nd World War and D-Day. I just wondered if you had seen a copy of this 'letter' from King George VI, given to me at the school I attended in London.

'God Save the King' and 'Land of Hope and Glory' were sung VERY robustly, a prayer was said by our Headmistress for our noble servicemen and women and for all those that suffered.

I have photocopied the original which I enclose herewith for you. If you haven't seen it before it may be of interest; the dates are on the reverse side.
